




BATTLE OF BRAINS: RANJIT SECTION TRIUMPHS!




"Glimmers of Togetherness"

It was indeed a graceful, memorable, and well received gathering in the true festive spirit of Diwali and the season of togetherness.
















MILITARY HISTORY SEMINAR























VALLEY OF WORDS

Then he mediated upon thinding free of himself he realized, what he wanted rested in the mischief



The Zaki family of Hyderabad embodies an extraordinary legacy of national service, leadership, and intellectual pursuit that spans multiple generations, institutions, and branches of the Indian Armed Forces. At the head of this remarkable lineage stands Lieutenant General Mohammad Ahmed Zaki, PVSM, AVSM, VrC, a soldier-scholar who joined the Rashtriya Indian Military College (RIMC) before India's Independence.

Commissioned into the Indian Army in 1955, he served with distinction in the 1965 and 1971 wars, earning the Vir Chakra for gallantry in combat. Rising through the ranks to become Chinar Corps Commander



ranks to become Chinar Corps Commander in Jammu and Kashmir, he later served as Adviser (Home) to the Governor of J&K during a critical period of internal security challenges. After retirement, he transitioned seamlessly into academia, becoming the Vice Chancellor and later Chancellor of Jamia Millia Islamia, where he championed institutional reform, education, and social harmony — symbolising the rare fusion of martial and intellectual excellence.

His younger brother, Brigadier Mohi Zaki, was a pioneer in India's military modernisation, credited with raising the country's first Mechanised Infantry Battalion, thereby helping shape the tactical doctrines of a newly mechanised army. The youngest sibling, Group Captain Haroon Zaki, pursued a stellar career in the Indian Air Force, flying fighter aircraft and later continuing his aviation career with Jet Airways until the age of 65. His journey bridged the worlds

of defence and civilian aviation, embodying the adaptability and

professionalism that defined the family.

Carrying the torch forward, Lt Gen Zaki's elder son, Colonel Ali Zaki, followed in his father's footsteps by joining the Army. After honourable service, he moved into academia and international civil service, representing the intellectual evolution of the family's service ethos. The youngest son, Major General Khalid Zaki, continues the martial tradition as a serving officer, notably commanding the same mechanised infantry unit once led by his father — a powerful symbol of continuity and devotion to duty.

When the family gathered at the 1982 RIMC Diamond Jubilee, five Zakis — spanning the Army and Air Force, two generations, and diverse branches of service — came together for a memorable photograph in the Pratap Section junior dorm corridor. That image captures more than lineage; it reflects a living tradition of courage, excellence, and service that continues to inspire generations of Rimcollians and Indians alike.



THE STARFISH MOMENT

An old man, walking on a beach one morning noticed a young woman walking ahead of him, as she walked, she would would bend down every now and then, picking up starfish and throwing them back into the sea, catching up with the women, he asked her why was she doing that. The beach may be long. There may be millions of starfish. But throwing our back means one life saved. You can make a difference.


