Aldrin in their first ever historic voyage to moon. A piece of the rock was exhibited by kind courtesy of the U.S.I.S. at the I.T.I. Kharagpur where the 57th session of the Science Congress was held last year. After seeing the moon rock we were given a nice talk by Dr. Gopalan the distinguished Indian Scientist who was invited to do research on moon rock at the University of California—Los Angeles.

The rock as we saw it was ash grey in colour with a very shining character. We know that the moon is a homogeneous sphere and its mass is 1/4 of the earth' mass and the density is 1/8 of the earth. Due to its weak gravitational pull the moon has no atmosphere to hold anything. The dark side of moon as discovered by scientists is more smooth and plain than the front side which faces the earth. This side is full of rocks and craters. Some of these boulders of rocks are about 3 or 4 Km. in diameter. The radius of the moon is 1400 miles and as compared to earth it is 1000000 million years older. Its size is 1/4 of earth's size.

The moon rocks are classified into 4 groups. A group was molten before and as it became solid, a lot of vacuum was created between them. 'B' group is almost similar to 'A'. 'C' group rocks are very big and by agents of erosion are gradually crushed into powder and form group 'D' which is like pebbles. The craters of moon have stiff sides which are not plain. Some of them are plain also.

The moon is about 4000000 to 4050000 years old. It moves on its own axis round the year and as the earth also moves round its axis therefore the same side of moon always faces the earth.

As observed, there are frequent moonquakes.
These observations came wrong in the recent
6 months when a seismograph was left on moon
by Apollo-11 yet it did not record a single tremor.

There are high mountains on the moon. It is really interesting to see such moon rocks as they inspire in us love for further knowledge about so-called celestial bodies.

Everytime I woke up I could hear low conversation and curses and the ever-chattering teeth of V. Mehta. Every single cadet was awake in his own way, the night seemed endless and even Cadets like M. Singh, Dhillon, Sud became astronomers for that night. There were excited whispers from A.D'S. group and the reason was that ghost stories were dominating them. Oh! what a restless night we spent. We longed for the sun, instead the moon came up. We turned from side to side playing hide and seek with the cold. However, we reached Mussoorie at 11.30 a.m. and were warmly received by Mr. Bisht who directed us to our rooms at the Sylverton. What a relief it was to sleep that night on proper beds instead of the cold earth! tasty food, instead of leather-like puris but we did miss our tea very much. The hike was a new experience, a valuable one too, and more hikes of this sort should be encouraged for the cadets in years to come.

Cricket Match-RIMC vs St. Joseph's Academy

They must bear in mind that military education is not plain sailing and there is no royal road to success in life.

As the popular educational dictum goes, we 'catch'em young', for in doing so we aim at implanting socially worthwhile habits and attitudes on their growing minds and thus shape their growth through a formal educative process and training. Whereas we do not decry home-influence as such, we nevertheless, feel the necessity of gradually weaning the young away from too much of dependence on others and hence underline the role of slowly building upon their informal home education something more desirable for struggles and adventures of real outdoor life. Much harrowing criticism that has lately been levelled against the system of education in Public Schools is contradiction in terms and much more can be said in defence of the positive side of such schools.

Pertinent in this context seems an apparently odd reason given by the famous Roman academician Quintilian in his great work, 'De Institutione' for approving public schools, and fresh sparks may be struck from it even now. The merit of public schools is, he says, that they keep a boy away from home-influences. What a satire upon home-life, we may think, but how often does too much of 'home' that the boy brings with him to the school contend with the thoughtful temper of the school master, to whom education is not only an enjoyable experience or a delightful activity but also a discipline, a humanizing influence, a dynamic socio-cultural awareness that can be brought to bear upon the growing child through a conscious enlargement of his outlook and the desired modification in his behaviour. For, afterall, what is a school? Briefly stated, a school is but a judiciously 'controlled environment' the sheltered cloisters of which have two objectives to achieve to be, as king George V put it, 'a powerhouse of learn-

ing'. The first aim of a school then is to impart such a sound and wholesome education as may weld the boy, mind and soul of an into a harmonious, integrated personality and secondly, in order to do so, it does its best to protect him from being swept off his feet by the mighty influx of pernicious trends that perpetually contaminate life at large. Moreover, to flourish an institution must have models to furnish, examples to set and ideals to blaze to inspire its youth. Assuredly, our cadets can look up to their worthy predecessors for illustrious examples of selfless service and sacrifice and can boast themselves of the firmly established traditions of the college that have impelled our cadets to ever greater heights of gallantry and heroism. They must draw inspiration and strength from their Alumni-the Rimcollians-and conduct themselves in a manner worthy of their great Alma Mater-Rashtriya Indian Military College.

Once again, we urge upon our cadets to rise to the occasion and materialize the hopes that have been built upon them.

Kalidas the Shakespeare of India excels them all as his awe-inspiring monody Megh Duta is considered to be the Magnum Opus of the Sanskrit lyric poetry. Briefly, it will be no hyperbole to remark that the two muses of lyric-cum-love poetry and music viz. Erato and Enterpe combine together and bestow their pristine glory and lustre on it.

As soon as we reach the middle of month we find it surcharged with supernatural fervour. Fifteenth of August is the date of Assumption of Virgin Mary. The date has also gained a special momentum in India due to two major events of extraordinary importance. Firstly the Mahasamadhi of Sri Ram Krishna Pramhansa the religious preceptor of Swami Vivekanand and

the birth of Mahayogi Aribindo Ghosh who was born in Calcutta at 4.50 A.M. (Brahm Mahurat) on this date in the year of grace 1872. Patriotism was the very essence of his life. A revolutionary of extraordinary calibre he rightly deserves to be placed in the first rank of the Indian Nationalists who took prominent part in the struggle for National emancipation. He was the originator of the Passive Resistance movement which he most dispassionately advocated in the columns of Bande Matram in the frightful days of 1907. This movement ultimately took the shape of non-violent non-cooperation and Quit India movements in the hands of the Father of the Nation Mahatma Gandhi for the liberation of the motherland. His heart inspiring firebrand speeches on the public platforms and his vigorous propaganda wielded by his mighty pen in the press continuously from 1905 to 1909 shook the very foundations of British Imperialism in India. He was a self-realized soul and his last extempore speech at Uttarpara (Bengal) which he delivered on 30th May 1909 was his last message to the nation and was a real revelation. Ultimately from an inner call from his ownself he was convinced that the modus operandi so far adopted by him was ill suited for the occasion. Consequently he completely surrendered himself to Almighty and retired in seclusion to Pondichery, the venue of Maharishi Agastya's penance on 1st April 1910. On this sanctified spot he was able to make telepathic connections with the Omniscient on the basis of Yogasutras of Patanjali Maharishi and after a constant vigorous penance of 37 years was able to crush the bulldog tenacity of John Bull to pieces and make him yield to India's just demand for self rule on 15th August 1947 on the occasion of the anniversary of his 75th birthday. In fact he swallowed the vast British Empire of India in a Jiffy in the manner of August sage Ghatyoni who swallowed ocean in olden times. Indeed the attainment of Swaraj through non-violence was a miracle of first magnitude and was only possible through the constant joint efforts of two selfless Karamyogi Saints Mahatma Gandhi the world renowned votary of non-violence and truth and Mahayogi Arbindo the rebellions saint of Pondichery who literally proved the efficacy of Tennyson's oft quoted lines "More things are wrought by prayer than this world dreams of." Thereby the old order of the British Imperialism has changed and yielded to the new order of the Government by the people of India themselves.

In the end it will not be out of place to make a passing reference to a living female luminary of Indian Nationalism Shrimati Vijai Lakshmi Pandit who illumined the 18th day of this hallowed month by her august birth at the very dawn of the current century of the Christian era.

From her very bib and porringer she became the cynosure of the Nehru family and an object of adoration and devotion for its Pater Familias who observed her fifth birthday at the banks of Rhine in Germany in a magnificent manner. She also received much coveted appreciation of the British Royal Family in Delhi Darbar of 1911 due to her punctilious etiquette and fluency of her speech in pure cockney tone and accent.

She joined the Freedom Movement at a very early age when she had not reached even the age of puberty and ere long became a Bete Noir for the watchdogs of British Imperialism. Shrimati Pandit is both a De Jure and De Facte political Pundit. She has adorned various dignified Political assignments with dignity and honour during the period of 1936-1968.

After a hectic political career of nearly half a century she with her Argus eyed political sagacity deciphered signs of times on the walls of parliament house in New Delhi and foresaw the shadow of coming events and retired from Public life in 1968 and is now taking rest in the Doon Valley. Although a declared Septuagenarian she appears to be quite young with her silvery looks, shining face and sweet tongue. May she live long to guide us.

Under the circumstances August 15th on which our National Flag is unfurled every year on the Red Fort of Delhi will always remain a real red letter day.

The sky was overcast and the rains were fast approaching when the ball was kicked off. The game started with some lightning-like moves by both the teams. Barely had a minute ticked away, when CRK had the mortification of striking the upright. The visitor's half-line was an asset to them and the forwards were fed very well but in vain. There was a narrow escape for the R.I.M.C. citadel when a prompt shot by their centreforward missed the target by inches. That was all the visitors could achieve in the play. R.I.M.C. soon took charge of the proceedings, S.K. drew first blood for his team and paving his way in from the left flank he eluded the custodian with a grounder (1-0). An Unforgettable Day of My Life

The most unforgettable day of my life was 9th October 1969. This day was a very happy and joyous day for the whole of India as it was the sacred day of 'Diwali'. But this 'unhappy Diwali' day brought sorrow to my life because it snatched away from me my dear father aged only forty two. We all had expected that he would make old bones, but our hopes did not materialize.

On 7th October 1969, the office peon came and informed me that Mr. R.C. Sharma, my Section Master, wanted me in the Staff Room. I got shocks and went with a thumping heart as I was expecting a reprimand. I thought I was called to face the music for some slackness on my part. Now I had to bear the brunt of it. But when I entered the Staff Room, I found, to my great surprise, Mr. Sharma sitting with an indifferent look. Some other masters also looked serious.

Mr. Sharma told me to pack up and go to Delhi, as my father was ill. He did not tell me that my father's condition was critical but told me to go to Delhi, though my sixth sense told me that such a favour was unusual and forboded something evil.

When I reached home, I was thrown into the dumps when I found my home vacant. I got puzzled. The gentleman who lived next door told me that my father was on death bed and I should rush to his bedside in the hospital as soon as possible.

I never had a taste of such an experience. On my way to hospital I was literally crying and praying to God for the recovery of my father.

The first thing to meet my eyes was my mother. I couldn't speak, so I just touched her feet. She wanted me to go inside and see my father.

Now, this sort of trial was really too sore. On such occasions one has to hide one's feelings and has to put up a happy face in front of the patient. When I saw my father, I could scarcely control my tears. He cast a pitiable look at me. This was the first time I saw tears in his eyes. I could hardly control myself, and before I would burst out into tears, my uncle beckoned me out.

There was a large number of our relatives and friends, so I had to go home to sleep, while all the elderly people remained in the hospital.

On eighth my father showed signs of recovery. So I saw a ray of hope. But in the evening he started feeling unwell. I had to sleep at home again. As I had left him in a critical state, I was very much worried. My sleep had vanished. Fearful feelings troubled my mind, but then, I dismissed them as baseless, and reconciled myself with my lot, trusting in God. I have had many experiences fraught with suspense. I have seen many movies and read many mystery novels but the anxiety I had to face that night was most sickening. I was thinking about my father, whether, I would find him in a good state or bad. This question puzzled me and put me to unbearable anguish. I couldn't sleep that night,

Next morning, on my way to hospital it seemed that my heart was surging out. Its bouncing was accompanied with the shivering of my legs.

When I reached the hospital I read a sad look on everyone's face. I went to my father and saw him in a critical state, but he was in full consciousness. He looked at me and turned his face. I knew what idea had struck him with so deep a poignancy. He was probably thinking about my future. I came out. This was the last I saw of him.

In the evening I went to the house again. This was the Diwali day. The illumination of the market was hurting me. The decorations were nothing to me. I felt rather more uncomfortable on seeing all these things. The bang of the crackers seemed to pierce through my mind.

At night, suddenly my aunts and my grandmother stepped into the house with a lot of crying and sobbing. I sprang up from my bed and asked them the reason for their crying, though I knew it very well.

This was the most critical moment, I had ever faced. A fit of nervousness overtook me.

Next hour we were carrying his dead body to our native place amongst the sound of crackers and other sorts of merrymaking for others. But the sound of crackers was hammering me and the 'light' of Diwali shone my tears.

So, this was the most unforgettable experience I have ever had, and I hope this is last of its kind.
