INTERVIEW

- Q. Sir what was it that first struck you when you came here as A.O. ?
- Ans. When I came here I was roped in from regimental soldiering to administration of the College, I was proud of going to my Alma Mater. I would have liked to pursue regimental soldiering as it was my duty and this was an entirely different sphere.
- Q. Did you find the place greatly changed from your days?
- Ans. Naturally because change is the law of nature.
- Q. What do you attribute your success here as an A. O. to?
- Ans. I do not gauge abilities with achievement. I thought it was my duty to work hard and gear up the resources. I established a rapport with everyone and mobilised everybody's cooperation to raise the standards.
- Q. What do you feel about your attitude towards life here at RIMC?
- Ans. I was strict with the Cadets but had a soft corner for them. I had a human approach towards them and looked into the minutest details of their welfare.
- Q. What do you feel about raising our strength?

This trip to Mussoorie was really wonderful and marvellous. It was more enjoyable than a hike. Such trips refresh our minds and body for more arduous journey that life is.



hockey field. A basketball team which has been practising the game throughout the year would deprive the other cadets from playing the game because the courts would be occupied by that team. This would result in a dual loss; the boys of the College team will not play other games and the boys of the College will not be able to play basketball. So how far is specialization feasible?

Specialization will restrict a cadet to one game. But if he is capable of mastering many effectively then we will be depriving him of gaining some experience in other games. Thus if you bring in specialization you will be bringing a general lowering of standards in the RIMC.

BRILLIANT PERFORMANCE AT THE UPSC EXAMINATION AND THE SSB INTERVIEWS

Our results at the UPSC examination for the entry to the 72nd NDA course have been exceptionally brilliant. A total of 23 Cadets appeared and all made the grade thereby giving us HUNDRED PERCENT results.

This bonanza is a repeat performance for the second time within a period of one year and the second time best after 1965 for entry to the 34th NDA course. Against the back drop of this splendid performance, our boys have bagged six positions among the top ten (1st. 4th, 6th, 7th in the combined list for Army and Navy and 2nd and 6th in the order of merit for the Air Force) in the All India Merit list for entry to the 72nd NDA course. Taking into account a very small number of RIMC boys fielded (i.e. only nineteen) this undoubtedly is a sparkling performance and quite a rich haul of superb distinctions unmatched by any single institution. Thirty Years After

I joined the school in 1954 not knowing that I would be back as Administrative Officer after a lapse of thirty years. We have a natural tendency to condemn the younger generation and to worry about them unnecessarily. Consequent upon the younger generation becoming old with the passage of time, they too will start worrying about their youngsters. I certainly do not intend to glorify the good old days of my school time; nor do I wish to pick holes in the existing system.

Memories of those brighter, happier days when I was a cadet are always things of joy. When I step on the soil of RIMC, I know that I am at home. I feel her warm embrace in the beckoning air and I let my fancy take wing. And if I am permitted to paraphrase Shakespeare, "Age cannot wither her". RIMC has a superb campus and there cannot be two opinions on this; one gets intoxicated with the fragrance of its flowers. There is a generation 'gulf' between me and the present cadet but in the 'Rimcollian' family, such gaps are immediately bridged. I have been often asked these questions—"When did you pass out Sir?" "Any changes since you left, Sir?

I do not know what answer to give to such a sensitive questions. Admittedly, I am an Old Boy but being now on the Administrative Staff, I have to weigh whatever, I say. It is, no doubt, a very hard task to keep pace with the heels of the galloping creature called modernisation, but I can assure all the Old Boys and parents that RIMC has certainly not decayed or succumbed to the inexorable journey of time. The average cadet is just the same as he was years ago. Son will find the same experience and thrill as his father did RIMC cadets have improved on their performance, they continue to top the All India Merit List for NDA. Ninety percent of cadets make it to the NDA in their first attempt. In my days when one got 60 per cent, all used to look admiringly at you, if you get the same marks now, they shall be looking down their noses. It will be considered a low first. Noticeable painful change, is that the tub bath arrangements have been taken away and one time effective hot water arrangements are now non-existent. Thanks to paucity of funds and austerity policy of the Government.

There cannot be a school without a school bell. I remember one cold wintry morning we had removed the bell and hidden it. The school routine was upset and confusion prevailed the whole day, in the process we saved ourselves from the morning PT. But now we have a 'Siren' which is so annoying to ears, giving an impression that you are in a bonded labour camp. Whoever introduced it, is certainly devoid of aesthetic taste.

With the departure of Mr Singhal, the teachers of my time have gone. The trio Mr RC Singhal, Mr RC Sharma and Mr GS Bisht have left. They will be missed by the school. The gap created has been suitably filled by Mr K Kumar, Mr VG Nene, Mr LN Thakur and Mr UN Singh as Section Masters. It is heartening to note that bond of respect and affection between the student and teacher

still survives in RIMC. Nannu who used to ring the school bell still limps around as a retired man. Thaple our head waiter has also retired. Though there has been sea change in the class III and IV staff, yet many like Mr Khanna, (Lab Asstt), Mr Thapa (Librarian), Duli Chand, Bachhan Singh, Prem Singh and Padam Singh (Cook), are links in the chain. The 'Changing Room' still smells the same and the scotch egg still tastes the same. The cadets are still very fond of movies and they won't mind being awake whole night seeing movies on video. On smallest pretext they still wish to be excused morning PT.



- A. I joined the RIMC as a teacher in Mathematics on 1 Aug in 1948 and became the Section Master in 1957 after 9 years.
- Q. We hear that you went abroad. When and in what capacity did you go abroad?
- A. I had gone to the United States of America in 1960-61 as a Fullbright Scholar for advance teaching of Science and to teach Maths in the Baltimore Public Schools. I taught Mathematics to senior high school boys and girls and delivered lectures on India to various professional and literary associations.
- Q. What differences did you notice in the system of education between our country and the States?
- A. Our educational activities are all geared towards the final examination whereas their examinations are based on internal assessment spread over the whole year and there is no board examination. Their evaluation is more objective and graded.
- Q. What was your contribution to Baltimore Public Schools?
- A. I tried to establish personal equation through informal teaching. Propogation of Indian Culture and starting of a Mathematics Club were two things that I did. I presented a set of books on

India to the school library where I was teaching. I delivered a demonstration lesson to the first year teachers in Mathematics for this entire city (150 of them). I also organised a get-together on India's Republic Day.

- Q. Sir, you had an opportunity to serve with the British school teachers. What in your opinion were their plus points?
- A. The British school masters with whom I had an opportunity to serve, were very thorough and proficient in their fields. They were devoted teachers and worked very hard. Betterment of students, education and games was their only concern. They used to play and mix with the boys. In saying so I do not mean that our own teachers lack in any way.
- Q. What were your subjects at the school and college level?
- A. Well, I passed High School in the first division with distinction in Maths. I was a science student. I did M.Sc. Mathematics in II Division. I passeed my L.T. (equiv to B. Ed) from Govt Training College, Allahabad.
- Q. What differences did you notice in RIMC since the British teachers left?
- A. There have not been many changes and yet there have been. As far as the buildings are concerned there have been no significant or major changes but academically there have been rapid changes that have placed the RIMC in the mainstream of the nation's educational activity. During British days there was less emphasis on co-curricular activities. The boys used to have dramatics, photography, stamp collection and driving as the only clubs.
- Q. Sir, Do you have any memorable incident to tell us?
- A. I haven't any exciting experience to narrate but for my teaching which was always a matter of joy. I have sent 72 batches to the NDA and I feel very proud of it.
- Q. Sir, As the Vice Principal of the RIMC, what are your contributions?
- A. I am very happy to say that I enjoyed full freedom in the education block and functioned very well. Smooth running of the organisation; conduct of examinations and revision of syllabus are a few of the things; but the results are for you to deduce. I laid a lot of emphasis that the cadets go up in studies. I am happy to note that our cadets have shown excellent results both in SSE and the NDA wtitten examination.
- Q. Sir, we know Mathematics is your love, what else did you teach?
- A. I taught Physics and Chemistry to senior cambridge classes for 6 years. Physics is my second love.
- Q. Sir, Do you think we are getting the best material for the RIMC through the entrance examination?
- A. Yes, on paper but actually not. There are hardly 7 to 8 boys from several states and they do not fare well.

- Q. Sir, who is the senior most student taught by you?
- A. Maj Gen VP Yadav. He was the winner of the "Sword of Honour" at the IMA from the first JSW Course.
- Q. What are your thoughts at this juncture?
- A. I enjoyed my stay here tremendously. I spent my entire youth in the youthful company of you boys and never felt old. I wish the retiring age in India were 65 like what it is there in the USA. The loss of leaving RIMC can never be compensated. I shall cherish these fond memories.
- Q. What is the contribution of the RIMC to the nation?
- A. Old boys of this institution have risen so high both in India and Pakistan that it is for every one to see and this record can not be matched by any single institution. This is no place and there is no time to place on record all the achievements of our old boys.
- Q. What are your plans on retirement?
- A. If I get some teaching assignment commensurate with my status and experience, I will take it. I also propose to take to writing books on Mathematics.
- Q. Would you keep in touch with us?
- A. Yes, I shall always be in touch and of course I shall never miss the Rimcollian meets.
- Q. Sir, what is your advice to us?
- A. The cadets of RIMC are a special class. They should aim high and never be satisfied with mediocre performance because they have the potential. The cadet must remember that they are the students of this renowned and great institution and must exhibit so in all their dealings

Excerpts from Mr Singhal's farewell Address

The Commandant, Members of the Staff and the cadets,

Standing as I do, at one of the major turning points of my life and career, my memory dips back into the distant past when on August Ist, 1948 I joined this college as one of the first batch of Indian Masters at the young age of 22 years. This is about the age when a man is filled with high ideals, hopes and aspirations for the institution he is called upon to serve, and for similar ideals and

hopes etc for shaping his own career. Now I retire at the age of 58 years in 1984. The digits in the years 48 and 84 have incidently been reversed.

My duties as a Section Master of Pratap Section (old Rawlinson Section known for having housed the elite of Rimcollians in Maj Gen Hira Lal Atal, Late Gen KS Thimayya, late Lt Gen PS Bhagat, late Major Som Nath Sharma, Maj Gen Virendra Singh, Mr Bikram Singh and late Gen Shahnawaz Khan etc). Since 11 May 1957, gave me an opportunity of coming into the closest contact with the cadets. I have always regarded a Section Master's job as a very challenging one—for it is as a Section Master that one can study the needs and requirements of the cadets individually and help them blossom forth into good gentlemen and gallant officers.

Partings are proverbially painful, and all the more so when one has to part from an institution to which one has given the best period of one's life and where one has grown up and learned a lot, and from individuals with whom one has spent some very pleasant moments. I shall cherish the fond memories of my long association with the RIMC for the rest of my life. It will be difficult for me to say good bye because one does not say so to one's home. I had the protection of RIMC all these years but I am sure your blessings and good wishes will stand me in good stead in my retirement. You all have been so good to me.

Thank you for the grand and touching farewell I have received. I wish all the cadets the best of luck and all happiness in their future career. Keep the RIMC fiag always flying high. Long live RIMC and may it continue to shine in its own glory.

AN OPINION POLL: AN ANALYSIS

- Ans-1. 65.5 percent of the cadets preferred movies to book reading or music listening on a Saturday night.

4th National Sub Junior Squash Rackets Championship was conducted from 4 to 7 Oct 84 at Squash Courts of our School. Boys below the age of 14 years were eligible for the competition. 17 players in all took part in the competition-nine from The Doon School, five from the hosts RIMC and three individual enteries from Bombay.

NATURE CAMP

In order to develop a sense of awareness among the cadets of RIMC about the need to preserve the ecological balance and to improve the environment through theoretical learning and practical training, a camp was organised in the Shiwalik forest area of Dholkhand Range, Distt Saharanpur by Wild Life Institute of India, Dehra Dun.

On 16 Oct 84 the cadets of Class II attended the camp which highlighted the need for preservation of Wild life for the sake of environmental balance. The cadets were given to understand the productive and protective functions of the forests. Forests are the home of wild life which includes both plants and animals. Wild animals and forests inhabitants are inter related in a set of essential ecological process which constitutes the balance of nature. The cadets were told about the wild animals and various plants specially found in Dholkand forest area.

DELHI-AGRA-HIKE

On 1st Oct we saw a number of historical places of great importance. At 10 A. M. we left for Fatehpur Sikri and reached there within an hour. Afterwards we could see the places and remains of this beautiful city which was built by Akbar in the 16th Century AD within a short period of only 12 years. We saw many places like khwab Gah, Panch Mahal, Diwan-e-am, Diwan-e-khas, the palaces of Akbar wives and many other buildings. The buildings were beautiful and carving on them were still intact. In Fatehpur Sikri we also saw Buland Darwaza, the highest gateway in the world and the tomb of Sheikh Salim Chisti made of sandalwood. We spent 4 hours in sight seeing in Fatehpur Sikri and took also many photographs. We returned for lunch and after a tasty lunch we left for Agra Fort. This fort was built in a period of 8 years and is beautifully built. We saw the rooms where Raja Todarmal kept his revenue accounts and the room in which Shah Jahan was held captive by his own son. From this room one can have a nice view of the Taj Mahal.

After seeing The Agra Fort we went to see the Taj. Every one was very happy to see the Taj and greatly impressed by its majestic beauty. We roamed there for hours and saw every detail of it. When we were having our dinner that night two Rimcolltans of the Para Regiment joined us and we had a nice chat with them.

On 2nd morning we packed our things and before leaving for Delhi, we decided to see Sikandra, It is a beautiful place. There were a lot many deer and apes roaming in the open. We left Agra at 10 A. M., On 3rd Oct we first went to see the Parliament houses. Even though it was a holiday, we were able to see most of it. We saw the Lok Sabha and Rajya Sabha. The central hall was closed and we could see it only from the outside. A person was there who explained us everything about the functioning of the two houses.

After seeing the parliament house we went to see Qutab Minar. We could see it only from out side. We also saw Quwatur Islama massid mosque, AIai Darwaza. Alai Minar (which is an unfinished minar) and the iron pillar which had still not rusted since the time it was installed there by Alauddin-khilji. We returned for lunch to DPS and after that we were taken to connaught place and allowed to roam about. After an hour we went to Red Fort. Major PKK Raju had arranged a lovely tea for us in the 5th Garhwal Mess. After the tea we saw the sound and light show in the Red Fort.
