Extract of citation from "Gazette of India" dated 04 April 87

MAJOR ASHOK KUMAR SINGH (IC-27941), SM. ENGINEERS.

(Effective date of the award: 28th September, 1985)

Major Ashok Kumar Singh was selected as a permanent crew member of the Indian Army expedition around the world in a thirty seven footer fibre glass yacht "Trishna" which will go down in the annals of sailing history in India as a daring feat of enterprise.

Trishna had to sail from the United Kingdom to Bombay, the port from where the expedition was flagged off on the 28th September, 1985. Enroute the United Kingdom to Bombay, Trishna ran into fierce storms in the Bay of Biscay, rough weather in the Mediterranean and then again in the Red Sea. At one stage the main sails were blown off in the gales. At great peril, the crew managed to put up fresh sails and safely steer Trishna to Bombay.

Their journey from Mauritius to St. Helena Island around the Cape of good Hope, was a story of heroic fight against countless storms when wind intensity increased to sixty five knots whipping up waves to forty-fifty feet height. Tons of water broke over the small boat, washing away the life saving gear and packing of the wireless. They steered Trishna with steel nerves, keeping it on course.

The worst part of the journey was from Auckland to Sydney across the Tasman Sea where the crew faced one of the worst storms in 100 years. Braving through the dangers the crew reached Sydney with complete exhaustion and loss of appetite. The sail from Sydney to Brishbane further to Cairns and Thursday Island was equally difficult, when they had to steer past the Great Barrier Reef which was a great navigational hazard.

Major Ashok Kumar Singh, in spite to being handicapped having an artificial left leg, shared the tremendous difficulties with his team mates and displayed conspicuous gallantry in the best traditions of the Indian Army.

His visit will remain a milestone in the history of RIMC since he is the first Rimcollian of the Pak army to visit the College. He formed a part of the Rawalinson Section from 1938 to 1944.
