Thanks to the efforts of Mr H Catchpole and the old cadets at Delhi, the College maintained its distinct identity.

Now after 67 years of its founding RIMC has achieved a lot. We have produced three chiefs, Gen Thimayya, Gen Bewoor and Gen VN Sharma. Three Arjuna awardees Col Raj Manchanda, Brig DK Khullar and Lt Col KS Rao. The first PVC Maj SN Sharma and the first VC Lt Gen PS Bhagat. 
