NEWS IN BRIEF

- There has recently been a proposal to raise RIMC's strength to 600. The Chief Gen. B.C. Joshi has been showing personal interest in this regard and wants RIMC to be an international institution. (Incidentally his son Akshay Joshi is a Rincollian) From RIMC two proposals have been sent with a projected increase to 300 and 600 respectively.
- While on leave at Bombay the commandant met Vice-Admiral KASZ RAJU FOC-in-C Western Naval Fleet who gave him a lot of good suggestions pertaining to running of RIMC especially scholarships.
- Computerisation is on in a big away at RIMC. It is planned that in the near future most of the Acounting & data collection work at the RIMC will be done by computers including Cadets' dossiers, Archives, Library and Results. This has been possible with the induction of the new PC 236/SX Computer.
- A new trend which has been introduced is the interaction & involvement of class IV employees & their children. Various matches & sporting events are being organised for them in addition to various other welfare activities. The response from their side is highly encouraging. A special athletics was organised for them.
- Capt S.Srivastav & Capt J.Ismail performed exceedingly well at the Junior command course where they
 got BI &A.I respectively. Both have since rejoined their respective units after completion of their terms
 at RIMC.
- The SAI coach Mr. G.S. Thapa has been doing an excellent job so far as coaching of football team is concerned. He has also been helping boys in other disciplines. Very soon we shall be having a Basketball coach too.
- The RIMC doctor Lt. Col. V.K.Singh has been doing a commendable job. Infact he's been instrumental in getting all medical cases through in their final SSB selections.
- The staff condition in RIMC continues to be grim with a number of vacancies yet to be filled up. To aggravate this is the ban on certain categories of staff.
- The much awaited introduction of star TV has came through. But to the utter disappointment of cadets the exposure is limited to BBC news!!!
- The introduction of Discipline trophy has caused quite a flutter in the RIMC with the imminent danger that Section Masters might like to compete as to who gives maximum negative points to other section cadets.
- It's being planned this term to invite guest speakers who would lecture cadets on topics of importance.
- Capt Y.S. Meitei will be joining RIMC soon. (Ex-Shivaji)
- Ex-Air chief, Air Chief Marshal N.C.Suri (retd.) has introduced a sword of honour to be awarded to the best all round cadet of the college. The first sword of honour has gone to cadet V.J.Kurian (Ex Ranjit).
- Class IV employees have been provided with the cable TV as a welfare measure at a very highly subsidised rate of Rs 50/-per connection. The college has spent an amount of Rs 15000/-
- In the on going process of beautification of college campus about 250 rose plants and 150 bougainvillea plant have been planted at various locations in the campus including infront of the Bhagat Hall.
- In order that college records are preserved for long binding of Cadets dossiers and other records including service books has been undertaken.
- New steel racks have been brought and installed at the CSD for proper layout of items at the CSD. This has cost the college Rs. 12000/-
- New waterproof plywood boards have been installed at the Basket Ball court.
- 14 Div have very kindly agreed to undertake repair and renovation of the college gymnasium.
- About the Catchpole Rest house, the selection of site, building plan and architect have been finalized. The final sanction is however still awaited.

- New Honour boards have been fitted in the Mess, Bhagat Hall and Sections and all entries have been made upto date.
- Various New items of furniture have been provided in the Mess and Ante rooms.
- A sum of Rs 20000/- have been spent on repair of classroom furniture. This expenditure was necessitated primarily because of MES inability to take up such large scale repairs for lack of funds.
- RIMC corpus money of Rs 15/- lakhs has been invested with BEML and SBI i.e. Rs 10 lakhs with BEML and Rs 5 lakhs in SBI bonds both getting RIMC 13% interest. However the interest accruing from this shall be spent in the general upkeep and maintenance of RIMC buildings and other movable and immovable assets as MES funds earmarked for the purpose are too meagre.

Dearest Readers,



News in brief

- R.I.M.C. played IMA, NDA, Welham boys, & Doon School in Hockey cricket and Basket ball.
- Cricket cup was won by Shivaji followed by Pratap, Chandragupta & Ranjit.
- Classes went on hikes to Kanesar, Landsdowne, Chandigarh, Jodhpur, Alwar & Nahan.
- Chinese dinner will be served twice a month now in the Cadets mess.
- The model and blue print of the guest house being built from the grant by Mr. H. Catchpole has been designed.
- The College Basket-ball team participated in "Welham boys Golden Jubilee Tournament." and "Afzal Khan Basket-ball competition." Did well in both.
- Two guest lectures were organised by college in Bhagat hall.
 - 1) Situation in J & K Maj. Munis Raza (Retd.)
 - 2) Brain dominance Brig. B.M.Seth (Retd.)
- R.I.M.C. also witnessed the flagging off of the Mt. Kedardome expedition. The expedition team includes cadets between (14-16) years of age and is first of its kind in the country.
- College terminals are scheduled to be from the 16th of the May. Boards for class V A are starting from 6th of May.
- College welcomes two new faculty members both old boys. Capt. Y.S. Meitie (Ex Shivaji) and Capt. Sandeep Singh (Ex Shivaji) Both are currently on the mountaineering expedition.
- The new college P.E. has been approval with major gains to the college.
- A disposal bus has been presented to the RIMC by the Adjutant General. After necessary repairs the bus will be the private property of the RIMC and its maintenance as such the responsibility of the RIMC. It shall be a very useful addition to the RIMC fleet of vehicles.
- The Central command has sanctioned the following special works for the RIMC which incidentally constitutes 1/4 of the total works/repairs sanctioned by the command
 - (a) Bathrooms/Sewage 40 lakhs
 - (b) Kitchen 1.8 lakhs
 - (c) Woodwork joinery 2.5 lakhs
 - (d) Repair cl.IV lines 4 lakhs
- The above repairs will go a long way in bringing up RIMC infrastructure to the required standards.
- The drainage system at the college is being repaired.

- The end of term staff picnic was again organised this term by the staff secretary Mr SP Bhatla. It was great fun indeed for all the members of staff, the ladies and the children.

VISIT TO NDA

As you all are aware, every year, Gita and I visit the NDA Khadakwasla to meet our old boys at the NDA. It is a visit where apart from meeting the boys, we interact with the staff, try and assess the requirements at NDA and stay abreast with the progress and changes there. Most important is ofcourse the interaction Gita has with the boys and from which she truely does come to know the many problems they tell her quite frankly.

This year the trip seemed to be jinxed. I kept on post poning the trip due to various reasons till I finally visited the NDA on 24th April 1994; which incidentally was a Sunday. We had driven down from Bombay and had been lodged quite comfortably in the Officers Mess under the able supervision of butler Samuel, who was a waiter and a bearer when I was an instructor at NDA in 1971. After a wash and change of clothes, Gita insisted that we see the boys, and off we went to the Fox Sqn to try and locate any old boy. We did meet some and took them to the cafeteria which is being very well run by Col. Amar Chaterjee, (Ex.Ranjit) Col. Adm. at the NDA. There we met the ACC Dinender Singh.

We do not know how, but the news travelled very fast, Very soon a large number of old boys gathered around me. Shakeel Ahmed who was writing a letter in his cabin; after hearing the news that there was some lady at the cafe and that all Rimcollians had surrounded her and were talking to her, was sure that she could be no one but 'Mom' and he rushed to cafe. All the old boys were treated by Gita to ice creams (which incidentally are quite cheap there!)

Next day we went around and met the Comdt. of NDA. He was already prepared for this visit. He spoke of the high performance of the boys from R.I.M.C.. He gave various appointments that he had noted down. I also met Rear Admiral MS Bedi; Deputy Comdt and Chief Instructor at NDA. He spoke very highly of our boys. I also had a chance to meet the Battalion Commanders, Sqn. Cdrs and head of the training team, Col.Devraj Singh. All were happy with the performance of the boys from R.I.M.C. at NDA. I also met Offg. Principal and head of the Physics Dept. Prof. S.R.L.Rao. He reported that the boys were doing quite well.

A few pieces of advice he gave are worth mentioning here:-

- a) NDA syllabus is structured. It is easy to score high marks even if you study during class hours only.
- b) When ever you study, you must concentrate and study.
- c) To quote him, Low aim is a crime, so work hard'.
- d) In NDA one must opt for the science stream and a foreign language if he wishes to do well.
- e) The change of stream (science, arts, etc.) can be done only till the mid term exams of 1st term. or subsequently it can be effective only after relegation.

During these meetings I learnt that a new system, quite similar to that at R.I.M.C. has been adopted at the NDA, concerning games. The aim is to ensure that all boys play all games. There were also problem cases that I came to know of. In some cases I did the counselling. These cases are generally due to adjustment problems.

In the evening an excellent talk was given by Nani Palkiwala on the Indian Constitution, to which Gita and I were invited. After the Academy broke off, I met all the Rimcollians together. It was for the first time that we got to meet all the boys who passed out after we came to the college. It was good to see the Cadet Captain becoming the Battalion Cadet Captain. It was also heart warming to know of the excellent performance of BCA Ashish Kshyap who is also in the run for a medal. I was sad to know that Pratap Batra had to leave and of Shakeel Ahmed's father's death and that his mother was not well. Gita did console him and offered all help.

During my talk with the boys I highlighted the following points:

- i) Concentrate on studies
- ii) There is no difficulty in doing well if you follow a set routine.
- iii) Ensure that you are good in cross country and PT. The standards expected of Rimcollians are quite high, therefore we require to do that much better.
- iv) Do not have many Rimcollian gatherings because it leads to anti R.I.M.C. attitude which is not good for us.

After the lecture, the boys asked some searching questions about the increase of strength at R.I.M.C., standards of PT, games etc. The boys told me to convey this message to the cadets at R.I.M.C.- "Concentrate on studies and be good at PT."

Finally the boys had a delicious feast which Gita had arranged for them, from the Kayanis Bakery at Pune. The boys seemed to enjoy the feast very much and it reminded them of the time at school.

After that everyone got sentimental and we bid everyone good bye. The next day we drove off from NDA, Khadakwasla.

The R.I.M.C. Platinum Jubilee Mountaineering Expedition

- RIMC is sending a 30 member Mountaineering Expedition to Mt. Kedarnath Dome (6840 m) as a part of its Platinum Jubilee Celebrations from 30 April to 20 May 94.
- 2. As a part of the Platinum Jubilee celebration the RIMC is engaged in a multitude of adventure activities. The cadets took part in the Alak Nanda Gangas White Water Rafting Expedition in 1993 as the first of its adventure activities. Traversing the Ganges from Rudaprayag to Rishikesh, the cadets braved successfully one of the most treacherous rapids found in the country. Following the Mountaineering Expedition, the cadets would be undertaking another Rafting Expedition on the river Indus and a balloning expedition. In addition the boys are engaged in a number of co-curricular activities, such as Para-sailing etc. on a regular basis.
- 3. The RIMC Platinum Jubilee Mountaineering Expedition was flagged off by Lt. Gen J.C.Pant, PVSM, Commandant IMA at a ceremony held at Bhagat Hall RIMC on 30 April 94. Speaking on the occasion Lt. Col. MP Yadav, VSM, the leader of the expedition highlighted the salient aspects of the Expedition and the peakin particular. Lt. Col MP Yadav, Principal of Nehru Institute of Mountaineering, Uttarkashi is a distinguished mountaineer who has led a number of Expeditions including Nanda Devi, Namostong, Kangri, Sigri Parbat and Mukut to name a few.

Lt. Col. M P Yadav brought out that the climb would be in four stages. The team attempting the peak from the North West Ridge would move from the Base Camp at Upper Tapoban to the advance Base Camp at Kirti Bamak signaling the actual ascont to the peak. Thereafter moving through Camp I, the final ascent on the peak would be attempted from Camp II, At this time of the year, the snowline is in an area around Gangotti (3200m). The peak Kedar Dome being attempted by the cadets, mythologically speaking is the seat of Lord Shiva. The Ganges starts in this area which has the glaciers of Gangotti and Bhagirathi. The climb is both dangerous and treacherous after Advance Base Camp. Numerous crevices would be encountered after Camp II. This would be one of the youngest teams attempting such a peak. The highlights are:

(b) All climbing members are students and old boys of RIMC.

(c) It is the first school boy level expedition with very little experienced help.

4. The cadets have undergone a rigorous one month pre-expedition conditioning programme which has included mountain treks, specific mountaineering strengthening exercise and training in specific snow and ice craft as required for this expedition. The expedition has largely been made possible with help from the Army Adventure Cell in the form of specialized equipment and monetary assistance for the

OUR NEW AO

Lt Col VY Gidh has taken charge as the new Adm Officer of the RIMC. Vijay Yeshwant Gidh is ex-Shivaji (1967-72). During his stay at the RIMC, he was very good in studies and equally good in sports, particularly in Boxing, Swimming and Squash. He was a member of the camera club and a keen photographer. In the words of his section master, Mr R C Sharma, "Vijay is a sincere, hard working and an intelligent Cadet. He is quiet, smart and well-behaved." After doing his Senior Cambridge, he passed out after the Golden Jubilee in May 72, winning the Col Haughton's Silver Medal.

In NDA, he was in Lima Sqn and concentrated in sports and excelled in Boxing and X-country. Col DH Parab was then DO in Foxtrot Sqn and he remembers Col Parab having referred his boxing bouts in 1st term.

He passed out from IMA in Jun 76 and was commissioned into the 13 Punjab (Jind) which is one of the oldest battalions of the Indian Army, having being raised in 1772.

Both these posts were air maintained, the former being seven days walk from the road head and the latter being on the Eastern most tip of India, a journey of five days over Lohit River by ferry, by road on elephant and finally on foot. These two have been his most enjoyable tenures where, if one is lucky, the Air Force friends can bring back an Army person in only two hours time.

He is returning to Dehradun after over 15 yrs. He was fortunate to have his first peace posting with his unit after commissioning in Dehradun from 1977-79, before moving out to Sikkim. He remembers the hurried trip he made to RIMC for the Reunion in Mar 90, when he was LO to the Pakistani retired officers.

He is grateful to his alma mater for his initial grooming to whom he owes his success; to all his old Masters, particularly Mr R C Singhal and Mr R C Sharma. In his own words, "It feels nice to be back in the RIMC after so many years, to see the tremendous changes and improvements which have taken place, and the achievements of our cadets in all spheres. I hope I am able to do my bit for the College."

HOT AIR BALLOONING

The simplest form of aircraft is a balloon. Ballooning offers a great deal of adventure. Lately cadets of RIMC had been taking part in lot of adventure activities such as mountaineering, rafting and camel safari. Now the Army Adventure Cell plans to organise powered hand gliding and hot air ballooning for safari. Now the Army Adventure Cell plans to organise powered hand gliding and hot air ballooning for SIMC cadets. Two cadets from RIMC will go for ballooning expedition which is to go parallel to Himalayas. These two cadets will do this expedition with nodal centre 14 Infantary Div.

To give the cadets a feel of ballooning, on 23rd September morning at 6.30 AM ballooning was organised in RIMC. At 6.30 AM the cadets of RIMC along with members of staff were present in the pavillion. Major Yadav came along with his staff and the balloon was up at 6.45 AM. As they did not want to take the balloon much in the air. Once the air was filled they heated it with the help of the burners. Then soon the balloon was ready for the flight on the first day, that is the 23rd of September. The cadets of class V & VA along with some of the members of the staff got a chance to go up in the balloon.

The next day, that is 24th of September cadets of Class IVA got a chance to go up in the balloon. The best part of this ballooning was when they had a ful flight without the rope. Mrs. Gita Parab was one of the members present in the balloon. They went over ONGC, Ghanta Ghar and eventually after a lot of confusion and excitement landed at Col Brown's School.

This was a very nice experience and all the cadets and members of staff who got a chance were very thrilled, fascinated and scintillated and all those who did not get a chance are hoping to get one soon.

WHITE WATER RAFTING

On the 17th of October four cadets, Ashish Sunder, Abhijeet Tembe, Manish Kumar Singh and myself were told to go to Shivpuri to take part in the Four Square white water rafting challenge. We made some preliminary arrangements like collection of rations, buying of snacks etc.

We departed from RIMC on 12th evening by the Mussoorie Exp and took the connecting Malwa Exp from Delhi. We reached Indore at 5 pm and were received Lt Col N M Shankar. We reached Mhow where we were accommodated in the College of Combat officers rooms. We had dinner at a restaurant as it was too late to go to the student officers mess where we were supposed to take our meals.

The next day i e Saturday, early in the morning we went to play squash where we met Capt Kairon, a Rimcollian (ex-Shivaji) who also was a Services Squash player. He gave us a good workout. Thereafter we settled down and rested after our tiring journey the previous day.

The next day we had asked for the vehicle early so that we could go to Indore and find out our draws, opponents and play a few games at Daly Collelge who were hosting the Junior Nationals this year also. We found out that 5 teams had come for the under-16 team event, Inter-school from the best schools of Bombay, Calcutta, Madras etc. There were 34 entries in the under-16 and 68 entries in the under-19 catogories. We also had a good workout there and played with some of the top seeds like Vineet Asthana. After this we came back and prepared ourselves for our first match against Daly College which was a good team.

On the next day we left early for Indore as our matches were sheduled for 11.00 AM and also we wanted to see Doon School match against Bombay Scottish which was eventually won by Doon School. Punar Mann, our 3rd seed, match was first. He was playing against Siddharth Rajopadhya of Daly College in the under-16 team event. The match was close but finally Punor lost 3-9, 7-9, 10-8. After this the pressure increased on us we had to win both our matches now and we were 1-0 down. Ritwik Bhattacharya played next and won convincingly 9-1, 9-1, 9-1 against Gaurav Punakar. The third and final match which was to be the decider was won easily by Awish Jayswal. He won 9-2, 9-3, 9-0 to Rohit Khetani and hence we beat Daly College 2-1 and qualified for the finals which we were to play against Doon School, the defending champions who had beaten us 3-0 in the Zonal qualifying round at Delhi held earlier this year.

The next day we had a work out in the morning at Mhow only, after which we left for Indore. The under-19 individuals were to start today. Cdt PPS Mann played first. His opponent was Dinesh who beat him after a tough fight 9-6, 9-3, 9-5. The next match was Ritwik Bhattacharya who beat Kunal Bhargav convincingly 9-0, 9-1, 9-0. Awish Jayswal played next against Doon School U-19 Second seed Siddharth Swaroop. The match was very close and Siddharth Swaroop won in 4 sets 9-3, 7-9, 6-9, 8-10.

The next day we had 5 matches in the Individual Nationals out of which Cdt Ritwik Bhattacharya had 3. The under-10 individuals were to start today and the U-10 second round.

In the under-16, Cdt PPS Mann played 1st, his opponent was A Kukreja whom Cdt Punar beat convicingly 9-3, 9-8, 9-7. The next match was of Cdt R Bhattacharya who beat Jaikaran Juneja without any problem 9-2, 9-1, 9-4. Awish Jaiswal played next against Dileep Abraham whom he beat 3-0; 9-2, 9-5, 9-7. After the morning matches we were depressed as all of us had lost and it made us more determined to win our interschool matches in the evening against our arch rivals, Doon School.

Punar Mann played first and out-matched Sameer Bakshi in a close match. He won 10-8, 10-9, 10-9. This win gave us the encouragement we were looking for and brought us in the lead 1-0. The next match was very crucial and tough as the 1st seed Ritwik Bhattacharya had already lost to Rajat Khanna earlier that morning. But in the match that followed, a major upset took place as the top seeded Rajat Khanna lost 9-6, 8-10, 9-6,9-4 and every one was surprised. This victory got the cup for us and the third match between the 2nd seed A Jayswal and Rishal Sawhney was irrevalent and after a tough match Awish lost 9-5, 9-5, 9-7. Even then we were overjoyed as we had beaten the defending champions-2-1 and won the National Inter School Championship for the year 1994.

The next two days we watched the semi-finals and finals of the other categories. The under-14 champion was Arjun Krishnan (incidentatlly his father is also a Rimcollian) from Madras. The under-16 champion was Deepak Abraham from Madras and in the under-19 Vineet Asthana defeated Arif Paul to win the National Junior Championship. The prize distribution followed where the chief guest Principal of Daly College - Col Kak gave away the prizes to all the winners.

We left Indore the next day. Overall the arrangement done for us were excellent and we had no problems at all. We were looked after very well and were even called for dinner to many people's houses.

Our trip was a big success though we were not happy with our individual preformance and we hope to do better in the forthcoming tournaments at Bombay.

REPORT ON ATHLETICS MEET

The events were 14 in number namely 1500 m, High jump, 200m, putting the shot, 400 m, Broad Jump, Discuss Throw, 4x100 m Relay, 800 m, Triple Jump 110 m Hurdles, 100 m Sprint, Javelin Throw and 4x400m. Relay. The meet commenced at 10-30 hours with 1500 m Run. The points were to be awarded according to the positions of the various athletes, 7 points for coming first, 5 for second, 4 for third, 3 for fourth 2 for fifth and 1 point for the last position. In every event 3 athletes had

to participate from both the schools. In the 1500 m Cdt Sub NCO Vijyant Singh of RIMC came first and Cdt Vivek Moudgil 2nd. RIMC took a lead of 3 points from the first event. The other two participants of RIMC S Nayak and Sidhartha Chopra came 5th and 6th respectively. Run Doon School bagged the first, fifth and sixth position Cdt SS Randhawa of RIMC came second followed by Cdt Sub NCO Saurabh Gupta and Cdt Vishal Mann at 3rd and 4th position. In the Broad Jump Cdt SS Randhawa once again came first followed by Doon School, at third and fourth position. Cdt NCO K Ranjit and Cdt Sub NCO Saurabh Gupta came fifth and sixth.

In the Discuss Throw Cdt SS Randhawa bagged the first position followed by Fateh Singh of Doon School. The last event before the lunch break was 4x100 m Relay. The 800 m run was the first event after Lunch break RIMC bagged the first three positions with Cdt NCO Vijyant Singh Cdt Vivek Moudgill and Cdt Vishal Mann coming 1st, 2nd and 3rd respectively. Cdt SS Randhawa of RIMC bagged the first position in the Triple jump. The second and Third positions were bagged by Doon School. In the Hurdles Doon School bagged the 1st and 2nd position.
