NEWS IN BRIEF

The College reopened on 17th Jan after the winter vacation. The following is a sequence of events that took place in the few days since the college has

reopened.

- The college has secured 100% result at the UPSC written exams held in Oct. 1999. The SSB's for the cadets have already started.
- UPSC interviews for selection of permanent masters are underway in Delhi and Dehradun. For the first time a UPSC Board led by Dr Om Nagpal, member UPSC, came to RIMC and conducted the interview for Biology. The Commandant, Col Arun Mamgain has been attending all the interviews as an observer.
- Sqn Ldr KA Kariappa was blessed with a son on 11th Jan 2000. Our heartiest congratulations to him and Mrs Kariappa.
- Most of the cadets reported back on Jan17th 2000. However ,as usual, there were some late comers whose parents were called to the College to explain the reasons for the late arrival of their sons.
- Tabbing ceremony for the college appointments was held on Jan 18th. This time, in a novel experiment, the NCO's will be all from Class V as Class VA has been allowed 'all the time in the world' to concentrate on their studies. However, the Cadet Captain and the Section Commanders shall continue to be from Class VA. The appointments had lunch with the Commandant at his residence the following day.
- Hobbies were allotted to the cadets on the 19th .Surprisingly, there was a large number of cadets who wanted a change in their Hobby club.Some lucky one did manage to get it.
- The wreath laying ceremony was held on the 19th. The whole college took part in it. A special assembly was held at the Bhagat Hall. The commandant gave a welcome address to the college. The following awards were given to the cadets.

- Medical examination for class V and IIIA has been completed at MH, DehraDun.
- Vacation assignment tests in all subjects for all classes except VA have been conducted.
- Mr Sidharth Mishra visited college on 24th and 25th Jan along with Mr. Wadhwa of National Bal Bhavan for photographs in connection with the book he is writing on the RIMC gallantry award winners.
- Staff vs. cadets cricket match was held on 24th Jan which the cadets won. The Staff scored 112 runs in 20 overs where as the cadets scored 113 runs in 19 overs. A commendable performance was put up by Mr. Bisht who scored 50. The highlight of the staff innings was 54 extras including 38 wides , 10 byes and 6 no- balls. From the cadets side, Cadet BM Bulle batted well and denied the staff team a victory which, at one point during the match, looked quite likely.
- Cadets Vs. staff hockey match was also held in which the cadets again showed their superiority over the staff by beating them 7 – 6. However the cadets did have a tough time doing so as the score suggests.

- RIMC played two Cricket matches against the Doon Club. Our team won the first but lost the second.
- As many as eight members of our staff have successfully completed a computer training programme on networked learning conducted by Ms Pritha Ghosh of the Schoolnet India Ltd.
- In the inter section English debate, Ranjit section won followed by Pratap, Chandra gupta and Shivaji. Cadet Dhruv Yadav (P) and Cadet Anvesh Murthy (R) stood first in senior and junior divisions respectively.
- In the inter section quiz that followed, Shivaji (113) led the way followed by Chandragupta (100), Ranjit (86) and Pratap (67)
- First termers debate was held on the topic 'Parents and teachers know best'. Umang Nautiyal of Shivaji Section bagged the first prize.
- An Inter School Quiz competition was held at KV ONGC. Two teams from RIMC took part. Team A comprised Anbrasu, Vamsi and Anoop while Team B consisted of Alok, Rahul and Brijendu. Interestingly, Team B came first and bagged the trophy and Rs.700/- cash prize.





IN THE QUEST





COMMANDANT`S LETTER TO RIMCOLLIANS

Dear Rimcollians,

1 Bihar

Ever since I have taken over as the commandant of the Alma Mater it has been my most earnest endeavour to do the best I could to improve the overall state of resources as well as standards at the college. For the last ten years now we have been trying to bring back in the College the most basic and important edifice that any educational institution would pride itself on-the academic excellence. This step is now going through the usual upheavals associated with any important change and very soon we shall have a

system and culture at the College where our cadets shall be academically as sound as their counterparts in the best of schools

The second important area that I have been addressing myself is the improvement of our infrastructure in terms of creation of additional assets like: a multipurpose hall, computer lab, shopping complex, stores, and most importantly, special repairs to our aging Tudor buildings. We are also making up our deficiencies of accommodation for the cadets, masters and other employees. Thanks to the efforts of our senior Rimcollians and other senior officers and well wishers of the RIMC, we, today, have an in-principle acceptance of works to the tune of Rs 10 crores.

Where we do find ourselves straitjacketed, however, is the lack of flexibility in terms of finances to take up issues of general development of cadets, staff and others at the college. There are new developments taking place everywhere particularly in the field of information technology. We need to keep ourselves up to date with all these if we are to remain in the forefront of our chosen field. We have already got into an alliance with the Schoolnet India for training of our teachers in computers so that these can be used more effectively in the College.

The situation of masters remains as critical as ever with the College running at 40% of the authorized strength of permanent masters. Government rules on the subject are such that we have little option in terms of picking up masters of our own choice. The College administration is helpless in the sense that it can do no more than go for adhoc appointments within the stifling framework of reservations in various hues.

Some of you may wonder as to why all these problems have surfaced so suddenly. No, they haven't. What we have today is the cumulative effect of adhocism over decades. It is time we looked into the matter more seriously.

We pride ourselves as one of the best public schools of the country. Ironically, however, we are in a situation where we no longer attract good masters because our package for them is woefully inadequate

even when compared with the Kendriya Vidhyalayas. Successive pay commissions have been bringing down the status of the RIMC master with the result that today not only are we not attracting good masters but also not able to retain the ones already with us. The award of the Fifth central pay commission has proved to be the proverbial last straw in that it has effected a major decline in the status of the RIMC master vis-à-vis his counterparts in the Kendriya as well as the Navodaya Vidyalayas.

Our condition becomes most helpless when we have a situation where a master has left us and the UPSC appointee will take 2-3 years to come. For lack of resources at the college we can't appoint anyone from within our own financial resources. And the sufferers, of course, -the cadets!

Before I come to the main point of this letter I would like to mention the measures taken by various other institutions of national repute to overcome similar situations, e.g. IIT, Bombay. Their alumni have taken the lead to help their Alma Mater rather than depend on the government to solve all their problems.

I would, therefore, take the liberty to make an ardent appeal to all Rimcollians to set an example rather than follow one. If we really want our Alma Mater to continue to be one of the best in the country we need to take some urgent and extra ordinary measures. The sense of belonging to the 'school' that we all are so proud of beckons us to rise to the need of the hour, i.e., give our attention and help in this very important phase of its existence

We can make a beginning by setting up a special RIMC Corpus by contributing 1% of our annual income for the purpose. This will help the school tide over, among others, such problems as scholarships to needy cadets, incentives to masters and general improvement of the Alma Mater.


After this was the Rimcollians dinner. The cadets, on the 14th, saw off the Rimcollians, after the general body meeting.







For love, he is loving. In war, he is daring. For the needy, he is caring. He is always forbearing. He is a Rimco!





REPORT OF THE DISTRICT ATHLETICS MEET 2000

The 56th District Athletics Meet was held at Doon School on the 4th and 5th of Nov. The RIMC contingent comprised of 50 athletes. Around 37 schools from Dehradun took part including



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Oakgrove School from Mussoorie. Our college participated in the B Division (under 14 yrs), C Division (under 16 yrs), D Division (under 18 yrs) and also in the men's section (over 18 yrs). RIMC stood first in the D

Division and in the overall championship RIMC came second, the first position being won by Sports College, Raipur.

SPECIAL HIGHLIGHTS

Cadet Vinay Tiwari improved upon his own timing of 11.69 secs in the 100 mtrs (college record set at the inter-section meet). He ran the race competing with a national record holder belonging to Sports College, Raipur. He clocked 11.56 secs in the District Meet, which is now considered the college record. In the 200 mtrs race, Vinay Tiwari again broke the college record, which earlier was 24.1 secs. Now the record stands at 23.7 secs, which he clocked in the District Meet. In the 4 x 100 mtrs relay (D Division), RIMC won the gold medal breaking both the college and the district record. The team comprised of Cadets Tarkeshwar, Amardeep, Prashant and Vishal. They clocked 46.2 secs improving upon the earlier college record of 47 secs. In the cross-country race extending to around 8 kms, Cadet Chikara came 8th and Cadets Alok Kumar and G Joshi came 10th and 11th respectively. Another highlight that deserves special mention is, our Cadets took part in the men's section of 4 x 400 mtrs relay, competing with athletes much older than them from IMA and ONGC. In this race RIMC won the bronze medal, with IMA getting the silver and ONGC, the gold.

CAMPUS ENVIRONMENTAL PROJECTS



Thanks to our Estate Manager Mr. Prashant Sharma, grounds-men, gardeners and cadets from the hobbies club, a lot of activities are taking place to rejuvenate the environment in the campus. At the entrance to the Thimayya Gate 40 bottle

palm trees were planted each of an approximate height of 12 ft, on both sides of the road. For some unknown reasons none of the other varieties planted earlier survived, but the bottle palms seem to be thriving. Along side the bottle palms three rows of hedges of contrasting colours have also been planted. With the efforts of Shri Imdad Hussain, one of our very old grounds-men, these plants are flourishing. Also we notice the members of staff are showing keen interest in mushroom farming. An officer from the department of horticulture comes regularly to train them. Very soon we hope to have a mushroom culture functioning. The college garden is getting ready for the winter blooms. Transplantation of seedlings from the nursery is

under way and should be completed soon. We hope to have a garden in full bloom before the Reunion. We have so far harvested around 60 kgs of Soya bean from the Agro Forestry Project of the college. We are now waiting to harvest mustard and turmeric.

We have a plant in our campus, which is regarded by Palaeo botanists as a 'living fossil.' It grew as far back as 200 million years ago during the Triassic period of the Mesozoic Age. I would prefer them to be leaders in the military, which is one of the strong pillars in any society. Before that let us examine a few questions that come to mind.

Is NDA our only destination after completing the training here? Is it the sole all encompassing goal? Are we clear in defining our objectives? In

this article I would prefer to discuss the important issue, whether joining NDA should remain our foremost objective or we transcend into a boundless world of after school life? This is a moot point on which there are many views, particularly after the heroic exploits of our very young officers at Kargil.

I am all for NDA being our foremost objective. There are many arguments against this conventional thought. Some of them are, joining NDA is too narrow an aim for RIMC, similar to that of Military or Sainik schools. This is particularly embarrassing for many of us. Some say it restricts our vision and is not futuristic in the fast changing world today. Others say that the country and the world needs a premier institution like ours to look beyond. And there are many more.

What I have to say is simple and the answer that follows should naturally be simple too. Not like the one we are witness to, on "Amitabh Bacchan's Crorepati" show. The reader must have an honest communion with himself. What was the vision of the founding fathers? Can there be a greater service to society than defending one's motherland by joining the Armed Forces? Isn't the aim of joining the NDA equally holistic? Doesn't it cover all aspects of human development that is good, i.e. Moral values, mental capability, physical prowess and the art of social graces? Don't we owe something back to the society (the Govt) for spending a lakh of rupees for each cadet? Doesn't the route from the Thimayya gate, around the education block, the dormitories, the pavilion, the swimming pool the squash courts and the out of the world hikes and excursions cover more than what any other institution which feeds the corporate world?

It may be worthwhile to highlight two incidents that have made recent history in this great country of ours. Both involve the younger generation. On the one hand we have the bright stars in all those brave young officers who made the supreme sacrifice for their motherland at Kargil. Thanks to the electronic media, for the first time since independence the common man could see for himself what the Army does and earned true respect of the nation.

On the other hand we have men of the same age who cast a dark blot on our history. Yes, you have guessed right. I am talking about the cricketers

idolized by the entire nation, who were doing just the opposite. While the young officers were fighting and dying to guard their motherland, they sold theirs for few pieces of paper! So what are we talking about teaching wider values with so called wider aims?

If I may be permitted, I would like to go a step further and quote what a senior old boy mentioned sometime ago, "Why can't every student graduating out of the IITs, IIMs and other professional institutions in the country be asked to spend three months with Army or Air Force units in the forward areas and warships of the Navy on the high seas, before they take up their corporate assignments? They do so in some of the western countries? Initially we may start with volunteers, and slowly it would pick up. This attachment can be made out to be like fun and learning with a spirit of adventure. What they would observe, they would remember for the rest of their lives. It would cost the nation nothing extra but the society would benefit a great deal. It would open the eyes and minds of these bright young men to the real world of strength and character, values and vision, privation and hardship, quite apart from the glitzy and insulated world of carpeted air-conditioned corporate offices and quantitative decision making. These young men fortified with such sterling qualities learnt from this unique exposure would definitely be able to take more creative and humane decisions for the good of the society". I leave this thought with the readers in the hope that it may catch the eye of our policy makers.

Answers to such questions, lie within you. I for one am very clear. There is absolutely nothing wrong with the goal set by our founding fathers. We must continue to strive towards this goal, which has stood the test of time. Maybe in a utopian world in the distant future where there's everlasting peace, humans behave like humans and none behave like animals, maybe in such a world we would have no profession of arms. Till then let us steer the ship of RIMC in the new millennium along the course set on the 13th of March 1922 and whose trail blazes with luminous stars of the likes of many of our famous old boys, whose spirit echoes within the solid stone walls of our beloved echoes.


