TRIP TO THE END OF INDIA THE ANDAMANS

This trip was could not be arranged for the last few years due to some problems or the other. It was again decided in the previous term to try once more. At first the response from the cadets was poor, however on the last day the response was very good due to which this trip was finalised.

The cadets started arriving at Vizag by the 3rd

of January 2001. Our hike OIC Capt. Vivek Singh Asst. AO (Rimcollian) along with Hav. Kanwar also arrived on the 3rd. We were accommodated in I.N.S Ghorpad, which is a landing ship and has the capacity to carry 5 tanks. We stayed on board in the tank space. Most of the cadets had arrived by the 4th. In the evening

on that day we had a tea party with many Rimcollians including Vice Admiral Harinder Singh and Commodore Panda. This tea party was held in I.N.S Circars, which is the base HQ, beside the Naval Sailing Club.

The following day that is the 5th we went in the morning to the Naval Museum, which gave us a detailed idea of the various naval ports and also about the Navy. We then went to the submarine museum where the names of all the first crews of various submarines along with pictures and also various parts of submarines were displayed.

In the evening we went to I.N.S Sindhughosh which is the first Kilo class submarine acquired by India from Russia in 1986. After seeing all the compartments of the sub we went to I.N.S Rana, which is a destroyer class ship. The next day after a hearty breakfast we went to I.N.S. Satavahana, which is the only submarine training institution in India. When we returned on board in the afternoon we were told to pack up our luggage as one of the engines of the ship had stopped working. In the evening I.N.S Khukri which is a missile corvette docked beside our ship and in the night at around 11.00 p.m we shifted on board that ship.

Our ship at last set sail on the 7th at 12.30 a.m when all was dark around. All the cadets were awake and were eagerly on the bridge seeing the

ship slink slowly through the narrow channel with the Dolphins Nose with the enormous lighthouse on top of it to the right, the Port Trust to the left, the Hindustan ship building yard behind us and the Bay of Bengal ahead of us. We were too sleepy to see any more and retired to bed. We were accommodated in the Juniors Officers Mess in the ship.

The next day we awoke early and after our routine and breakfast in the Ward Room we went on top of the deck where we were all astounded to see blue sea all around us and the clear blue sky above. It was a very beautiful view and flying fish darting in and out of the water made it even more beautiful. We were shown how to

communicate by means of flags by the communicating officer of the ship. It is known as 'semaphore'. We were also shown the various methods of fire fighting. We were then shown around the Bridge and also in the Operations Room and were told the functions of all the radars, missiles and guns. The whole day went smoothly except for the fact that some of the cadets were seasick. The next day also went smoothly. We did some firing with LMGs.

The next day when we got up we were welcomed by a sight of beautiful green islands all around us. To think of the fact that a day ago we were surrounded by water on all sides with no sightings of land and now we were having land all around us. We docked at the Haddo Jetty, Port Blair.

We were received by Hav Angrej Singh and were transported by the naval bus to the Jak Riffles where we stayed in the Chaukas Charlie company. The following evening we went to the Cellular Jail. There we saw many museums and cells and afterwards saw the light and sound show. This jail's has 698 cells in it, which are in 7 buildings with 3 floors each. Seeing this some of us could not help but remember the sacrifice of all our freedom fighters who gave up their lives for the cause of freedom that we enjoy today.

The following day that is the 10th we went to the Haddo Jetty from where we took a tug to the



only floating dry dock of India. This dry dock was bought by India from Japan. It floats with help of 6 anchors on each side. We then left for Ross Island by the same boat. Ross Island was the place where all the British officers used to stay. Now it is in ruins. On the island we saw some deer and also the ruined houses, market place and the club of the British officers.

The next day was the most awaited day of the trip as we were going to the Jolly Buoy beach. We were up early and after issue of snorkels we left for the Mahatma Gandhi national park to take a ferry to the beach. The beach was a very beautiful one with clear water. We saw various types of fish, starfish and corals through our snorkels and also in the glass boat.

On the 12th we went to Samudrika, which is the Naval Museum at Port Blair. We saw various types of fish and corals and also shells. We then went to the aquarium, which was also quite a huge one.

The next day we were up very early and were ready by 5.30 a.m as we had to go for the beaching exercise which was conducted by the landing ships where they landed troops on the beach to attack the enemy. We were divided in 2 groups and the groups went in two ships. This exercise was done on the Corbyns cove beach and it was a very extraordinary experience for all of us. The rest of the day was given free to us.

The next day, the 14th, was the last day for us in Andamans. We went to Chidiya Tapu, which is the island of birds. We took a bath at the beach. The water here too was very clear but it was very shallow. In the evening we packed up and were back on the same ship. We left in the night at 9.30 p.m for our return voyage to Vizag.

On 15th January the sea was very rough. The water was rising above the deck and the deck was awash in salt water. The sky was also very gray. The next day the sea was again calm and the ship was speeding up at 20 knots, which is a very high speed. Few of us saw dolphins and we also saw many shoals of flying fishes. We reached Vizag on the 16th in the night at 10.00 p.m and docked successfully in the Naval Dockyard.

After a sound sleep we woke up late the next

day. After getting ready we went to the steel plant, which is the largest in India. There we saw one of the three huge blast furnaces and also the place where coke is made and after a detailed tour of the place we left for the ship.

The 18th was the last day of our memorable trip to the green isles in the Bay of Bengal. Sadly we packed, bade farewell and said our thanks to the crew and boarded the train back to Dehra Dun via Delhi. We returned back to the College on the 21st to a bright sunny but a cold morning, to begin a new term.

BIRDS IN THE RIMC DUCKS, TURKEYS, GUINEA FOWLS


Tony Johnstone writes from UK


"I was very touched and delighted to receive your christmas greetings with its light shining in front of the college entrance gates. Thank you very much for remembering me.





OPERATION SADBHAVNA



We the cadets of class II A would like to tell you something about the earthquake, which occurred in Bhuj and its surrounding areas on the 26th of Jan when the whole of India was celebrating the Republic day. At around 8:45 in the morning disaster struck the district of kutch when an earthquake which measured 7.9 on Richter scale hit the region and within a span of 47 seconds the whole area had gone haywire. When our commandant expressed his desire to send a few cadets to the quake affected areas during the assembly; our class took the initiative by putting forth a request application expressing our desire to go to Bhuj.

On the 20th of March, dressed in our OG kit we went to visit the Army School Bhuj. We met the principal Mrs. Geeta Soni who told

us that the school building had suffered a lot of damage but fortunately there was no loss of life. The entire strength was 1050 out of which only 12% were civilians. The school was established in 1990. After the earthquake the classes were conducted in tents. During our interaction, the students told us about their experience of the earthquake. They told us that their Republic Day Function was in progress when they suddenly saw the stage shaking and the building cracking up. Then we moved to Kendriya Vidyalaya No.2. Almost the same routine took place out there but the children were more frank than those of Army School. We also interacted with the staff members and the principal Mr. KN Mishra. We came back by four in the evening and were off for the rest of the day. Most of the evenings were spent by playing Basketball

and watching T. V.

On the 21st morning we had a tea party with Brig. Deepak Sood who is also a Rimcollian. He joined as a Shivajian but passed out as a Chandraguptian. We then went to the Municipal Corporation of Bhuj from where we collected bleaching powder in trolleys. We then spread it around the town of Bhuj. It seemed a little irritating to our nose due to its foul smell and we went sneezing all around the town. On our way we came across places which seemed like massive fields where debri was dumped but they were actually rows of houses that had fallen down. It seemed a little

tough but we completed our work with sincerity


On the 22nd of March with a day's experienc spraying D.D.T on our side we went ahead to perform another day's spraying but this time we were in Anjar. which was the

worst, affected town. Anjar is 41 kilometers away from Bhuj. We also sprayed liquid medicines for which the machines were provided to us by the Red Cross society. 90% of the buildings were destroyed and badly damaged. We interacted with many people over there and came to know their experiences during the earthquake. We also saw a memorial built by an engineer regiment at Anjar in the memory of the 10000 people who died in the earthquake. On the top of the memorial was a crest carved on beautiful marble that looked like the ROBA crest. Here due to the vast damage the debri gave out rotten smell and there were two occasions when few of us spotted mutilated dead bodies under the debri. Few workers of the municipality told us that due to the poor response of claiming, the dead bodies were now being burnt along with the debri.

On the 23rd of March we walked to the village called Dhrang which is nearest to the epicenter. This is 30 kms away from Bhuj and 15 kms away from the epicenter. There we were divided into two groups.

One of them removed the debris fallen over

the temple the other group had



etc. from the debris of the shattered room. We also took out many utensils which too were under the debri. After that we visited the epicentre of the earthquake near a village named Lodai. The epicenter was little into the Rann Of Kutch and was surrounded by barren land with cracks all over it. On our way we spotted a lot of mirages. The epicenter was a huge hole filled with saline water. It is said that when the earthquake occurred the water went almost 15 feet in the air.

On the 24th, of March we visited an institute

called Veirayatan Vidyapeeth. This institute is run by a Jain Sadhvi of the Bihar Rajgir Jain Sabha. This was situated in the Shivparas Mandir 8km away from Bhuj. It had about 1400 children and it was an Adhoc school for 6 months. The basic aim of the school was to help the students to recover from the shocking incident. We put in all our efforts to raise their spirits and the children over there were also very cooperative. We spent an entire day with them.

The 25th of March which was a Sunday, we took a break from our daily routine and went to the Mandvi beach 61km away from Bhuj. Some of us got a view of the sea for the first time. We had a lovely time bathing in the sea, drinking coconut water, gulping Davelis, enjoying ride on camels etc. This was followed by a visit to the Jain temple. The temple was established in 1987. After that we had lunch over there and made our way back. In the evening we celebrated Cadet Vaibhav Sinha's birthday.

On the 26th of March we visited a village named Rudramata which is approximately at a distance of 62km from Bhuj. There we were divided into two groups. One of them went a little further to a place where many people had come and settled down as their villages were destroyed. On interacting with them they told us their problems like shortage of water, electricity, food etc. The other group asked the villagers of Rudramata if they could

help them in any way. On their request the group cleaned the area around a lake and dam. This dam called the Rudramata dam provided water to the district of Bhuj. We were back to our camp by 4:30 pm.

On the 27th we went to the District Magistrate's office in the morning. After introducing ourselves and our aim to him he gave us chocolates to distribute to various schools of Bhuj. Firstly we visited schools called Sukhpar and Veirayatan where we distributed 3 chocolates to each student. Then we also went to the Kutch Leva school.

Conclusion

There was a lot that we learnt from this trip, We had never imagined that natural calamities can take such a disastrous form. We also developed a sense of humanism towards other fellow beings in need of help. We learnt how to cooperate with one another for the benefit of others. We also saw the different sides of mankind, On one side we had people ready to give everything they had for the victims, But on the other hand we had people who even in such times were using all possible corrupt ways to earn personal profits. And ofcourse, there was a lot that we learnt about their culture.



CHIEF GUEST'S ADDRESS

Commandant Col.Mamgain, Mrs.Mamgain, Gen.Mohanti, distinguished and happy parents and dear cadets.

At the outset, on my personal behalf, on behalf of the Ministry of Defence, Govt.of India I am indeed privileged to be amongst your in this very important function of the College and as told by the Commandant-"the first bureaucrat to be present on a function like this".

I say it as matter of fact that RIMC occupies a very special and a very privileged position in this scheme of Military Education and Training. I look after the entire training of the three services that includes 39 major institutions of Army like-IMA, NDA and series of technical institutions, which are highly professional and perhaps some of the best in the world. But the foundation of all education and the foundation of what make the soldiers, starts from here. RIMC is not the only source but perhaps the best and the most privileged one to belong to and therefore I would like to congratulate each one of the cadets who are passing out of the school and of course those who are eventually going to join the NDA. I would also like to congratulate the Commandant and the Staff for their deep involvement in shaping and grooming the cadets.

I have (maybe I don't look like) put in 29 years of service. I joined the service in 1971-72 and this is my 12th year as a joint secretary to the Govt. of India. I have headed a number of companies and was in the board of management of nearly all the petroleum companies. I have travelled extensively and visited many institutions but I feel very very proud of the fact that we have in this country an institution like RIMC.

Tradition is not static but dynamic. It is something that changes, that evolves and that has to add on. Warfare for example is not the same that we fought 20 years ago. Things change and much of what is happening to RIMC goes of course to the Commandant and the Staff for doing a wonderful job. They need a special compliment.

I would not like to give you a very long talk ladies and gentlemen but I would certainly like to share an experience with you. My first posting was in Coorg in Karnataka. Coorg is a very small district, perhaps one small place in this part of world, which has produced two Chiefs of Staff, Commander-in-Chief, a Field Marshal and number of Generals and Officers from literally every single household. I was a young Asstt. Commissioner of 25-26 yrs and had the privilege of being the neighbour of Field Marshal Carriappa. He was a 75 yrs old man, 6'2" tall while I was about 5' 5" to be very precise. We used to walk every evening on the streets of Merkara. Coorg is such a place where it rains continuously in the form of drizzle and Merkara is a hill where the roads are winding in a zigzag manner. The peculiarity of the Field Marshal was that he would walk in a straight line. If he had to go to a destination he would never follow the path but rather go straight down the valley, come up the valley, go down the valley, and again come up the valley- all in straight lines. As a matter of fact I used to be conscious that the Field Marshal should not slip and hurt himself at that age. So one day I took the liberty of telling him to be a little careful, as he was likely to hurt himself. He stood for a moment, looked at me and said nostalgically, "Raj, you know I grew up to be a soldier, I became a soldier, I became a General and now I have retired. But there are things that life had taught me as a soldier. A SOLDIER THINKS STRAIGHT, HE TALKS STRAIGHT, AND HE FIRES STRAIGHT".

I don't want to say any thing more ladies and gentlemen. Nevertheless, I want all the cadets who have passed out today to carry along with them in life what the Field Marshal had said because an Officer Like Quality (OLQ) is nothing but - "THINK STRAIGHT, TALK STRAIGHT AND FIRE STRAIGHT".

Just remember me....!



All are worried, but not Vikas, cool as a cucumber. Despite much pain, he commenced practising to write at the Military Hospital with his left hand. Right hand slung with heavy plaster, left hand

practising pencil circling of the electronic scoring sheet. Discharged from MH hours before the commencement of the long bus ride to Bareilly from Dehra Dun (10 hours), he left with his classmates at sharp 0800 hrs on 14 Sep. Sat for his exams on 16th. In the first paper which was Maths he could not complete

it all. This was because Maths involved writing out the calculations. That was not easy with the left hand. He could have done better but for the examination supervisors at Bareilly, who wasted precious minutes of Vikas by asking him to write out an application explaining why his original signature would not match with his present one.

Naturally so because he signed with his left hand! Unavoidable bother one may say, but this formality could have been complied with after the exam was over. But no, the heartless one insisted that it should be done before. Nevertheless Vikas completed 75% of the Maths paper with his left hand.

Model United Nations

The first Indian model United Nations an initiative of the Ryan International Schools was held at the PHD Chamber of Commerce on the 6, 7 and 8th of September, in which our boys participated for the first time.

It was a novel exposure, something quite unexpected because some of the subjects of the debates that we participated in were way beyond anything attempted in the college during our public speaking periods and the debating competitions at the inter section and inter school levels. Important major global issues were discussed, that presently engage the attention of the UN these days. It was an initiation for us for the first time to conduct ourselves in a diplomatic fashion. We also took part in the proceedings following the strict code and ethics of parliamentary procedures:

What surprised us the most was the active participation by girls. More than half of the diplomats were girls and that I suppose made us quite shy, despite

the bravado displayed by us during the first day's proceedings. However, we soon recovered to hold our own, as was evident from the fact that in the second and third days proceedings we largely held sway.

The Inmun opening ceremony began with the arrival of a galaxy of distinguished personalities in a packed hall of enthusiastic delegates. The Chief Minister of Delhi, Mrs. Shiela Dikshit, graced the occasion as the Chief guest. She appreciated the initiative and the efforts of the delegates in their pursuit towards world peace.

First Committee Report

In the opening session of the first committee the chair Mr. Ritesh Mittal, first explained the rules of Parliamentary Proceedings. The committe then progressed on the first agenda - illicit trade of small arms and light weapons. Cdt Yashwardhan of class IV A discussed at length this issue and almost all countries felt the need of curbing the illicit use of small arms and weapons. The UN First Committee decided to coordinate communication between developed and developing nations to create awareness among people to deal with this problem. At the end of the first day 3/9 resolution were selected to be deliberated. A resolution needed 2/3 majority to be passed.

Yashwardhan, A. Moorthy, R. Prakash, Sidharth Bhattacharya, Ashish Kulkarni, Kunal Rai represented as the Vietnam & Korean Delegates. Yashwardhan who was a delegate of Vietnam enlightened the house upon the illicit use of small arms and light weapons, which was warmly greeted and applauded by all delegates. While Anvesh representing Korea gave his country's views on monitoring of elections.

Second Committee Report

Tripti Arya, chairman of the second committee, initiated the session after explaining the proceedings. The committee had an effective discussion by delegates on genetically engineered foods. Siddharth and Kunal Rai raised serious concerns on likely problems caused by genetic engineering to the environment, and on issues related to health, ethics and society. Some delegates expressed the view that the world Bank should provide soft loans for further research on developing new strains and producing genetically engineered crops to eradicate world hunger.

Third Committee Report

Children in arms conflicts - A sensitive issue. The chair convened the first meeting after the roll call, the discussion was initiated by the delegate of Cameroon. The references to the UN protocol of 1999 which was signed for the rights of child protection were made. Mr. Sandy guest speaker from the UNICEF stressed that rich countries should raise funds for poor countries.

There is a lot to learn from such events. We were on our own and that gave us a distinct sense of responsibility. We learnt to discuss serious issues in a serious manner and come up with solutions in the form of resolutions. Most of all we learnt how the UN functioned. It was an enlightening experience that gave us confidence as well as drew attention to our drawbacks. Our two teams, Vietnam and DPR Korea were placed in the 21st and 24th positions. Next time we would fare better


practice we observed the good players and tried to follow some of their techniques.

Mr. HUGH CATCHPOLE AND HIS GUEST HOUSE

The Catchpole Guest House is situated behind the main office in the lush green area of the Rashtriya Indian Military College. It is named after Mr. Hugh Catchpole, a former principle of RIMC. Mr. Catchpole, fondly known as the "Dronacharya" of RIMC" joined as a young master on 26th of October, 1928. He went on to become the Principal of RIMC in 1948, and held the post till his retirement in the year 1953. after which he went to Pakistan and founded the Hasan Abdal Cadet College. In 1958, Mr. Catchpole took charge of the PAF College at Sarghoda. After retiring from the post in 1967, he became the principal of The Abbottabad Public School.

In 1994, Mr. Catchpole had remarked that he loved RIMC the most and planned to stay in the college permanently, after his retirement from Abbottabad Public School. It was then, that he gave a bountiful donation of Rs.15 lakhs for this guest house. The foundation stone of the guest house was laid on 13th of March, 1995 by Gen. V.N.Sharma, PVSM, AVSM (Retd.) a Rimcollian and a former Chief of the Army Staff.

The building was completed in 1997, but Mr.

Hugh Catchpole could not fulfil his desire to stay in it. He died at the age of 90, on 1st Feb 1990 surrounded by Rimcollians whom he loved at the Military Hospital in Islamabad, two months before he was to inaugurate the guest house.

The loss of Mr. Catchpole is one, which can never be replaced. Rimcollians and many others on both sides of the border deeply mourned his death.

mementoes after which cadet captain Aseem Kumar Panda delivered an emotional speech.



Cadet B.M. Bulle receiving the sword from Lt Gen. Khanna. He also stood $1^{\rm st}$ in the All India Merit List for the NDA



Here are also some interesting facts of history pertaining to the college



OUR CHIEF GUEST - A PROFILE

Sardar Surjit Singh Barnala, the first Governor of Uttaranchal was born on 21 Oct 1925. His father, a magistrate, died when he was only nine years and he had to struggle very hard for educating himself. He went on to graduate in law from Lucknow university, and participated in the Quit India Movement of 1942 and faced a police lathi charge.

He commenced practising in the District Courts at Barnala and in 1967 was elected for the first time as an MLA and was made the Education Minister two years later. That marked the beginning of his distinguished political career spanning over three decades during which he has held many high profile political assignments. He was the Chief Minister of the Punjab in 1985 when terrorism was at its peak, and has been a union minister Govt in 1977 and 1998. He has also been the Governor of Tamil Nadu

All that was the political side of Sardar Barnala. What is more of interest to our cadets and our readers is his human side. He loves the mountains. He has travelled

extensively around the Himalayas and other mountains of India, as well as the European Alps and the Canadian and American Rockies. He loves nature and loves painting its beauty. During the emergency of 1975 he was thrown into jail along with all political opponents of the regime then. Not in the least bit put off, he spent his time painting and he painted a lot many, which were exhibited twenty three years later in 1998 at the art gallery of the Patiala University. He is also an avid reader and writes too. He has authored "Story of an Escape" published by Penguin, which has been translated into Punjabi and is being translated into Hindi and Tamil.


ARTICLES AND FEATURES

MY STRANGE EXPERIENCES AT RIMC 15.3.2000 - Time 9pm

I was to receive a phone call from my father in my Section Masters' house. Right after dinner I sprinted like a lunatic afraid of the fact that I may miss the call if I was late. Something suddenly stopped me. As I turned back I saw a dark shadow across the road. I was horrified and ran on towards the Section Masters' house.

3.9.2000 - Time 9.30pm

I had forgotten to take some of my books to the dormitory from the class. It was raining, I wore my raincoat and walked towards the academic block. As the power had failed and it was pitch dark I took a torch along. Ahead of me I saw a man in a raincoat walking towards me. I didn't flash the torch on his face as it would have been impolite. 13.4.2001 - Time midnight

Our condition could well be described in the poem written on the board by our English Master after we related the incident to him the next day in class:



CROSS COUNTRY

Braving the chill morning air all boys descended on the grounds behind the Cricket Pavilion with a lot of excitement and anticipation for the inter section cross country competition. The juniors that is Class III and below were to run a distance of 3.85 kms and for the seniors Class IIIA and above the route was a new one the distance being 7.35 kms. The strengths of the teams were 23 and 20 respectively.

In the keenly contested inter section PT competition held on 10 Nov at the Parade Ground, Ranjit and Chandragupta shared the top honours with a tally of






first day's events were the heats in ten track events of two heats each, and finals in two track and four field events. This time there was a departure from the previous years in that, the winner

This was followed by a welcome cup of tea and delicious snacks.






























Having come overall first in their events in the recently concluded Uttaranchal State level competitions, our national shooting team of 24 boys accompanied by Capt. Vivek Singh, Mr Khushi Ram and our coach Nk Rashpal Singh from the Army Marksmanship Unit, Mhow, left Dehra Dun for Bhatinda in the early hours of 19th Oct, to participate in a national level air rifle and air pistol shooting championship for the first time at Badal, Punjab. They had very little preparation, their weapons were old, accesories limited and they had no exposure to competitions at such high levels. Infact the plan to participate in shooting competitions at the state and national levels was conceived only in August, and a 10m indoor shooting range made almost overnight. Yet their spirits were high and under the guidance of their coach they were mentally all set for such a big event. Its been rightly said, shooting is less a game of skill, more a game of concentration of the mind.

The competition was organised by the National Rifle Association of India. A total of 454 boys and girls participated from 145 schools all over India. RIMC took part in the subjuniors (under 15) and juniors (under 17) in both air rifle and air pistol events. Our team bagged 13 medals in all, 4 silver and 9 Bronze. Ishitab Vashist scored 298/400 marks, the second highest in the subjunior rifle category. He received a silver medal for his individual performance.
