It was refreshing to find the little new comers joining the exclusive brand of Rimcollians with their novel ideas.



Dear Sir

Thank you so much for your kind letter and the most interesting video of your college which my students and I enjoyed watching. We have not had time yet to read and explain the chronicles, we will do this when we resume school on January 10th.

We are now on holiday for a fortnight, we will start with a big dinner tonight on Christmas Eve, a big lunch will follow on Christmas day tomorrow and a week later it is the New Year which we will celebrate, these are very pleasant holidays, well deserved because the first term is very long but they are never very restful. When we resume school. I will ask my students to tell yours about their holidays.

Last Thursday was the last period I had with my group before the holidays and we made the video in Lusignan, it was very cold (minus 2 or 3) but we had a good time doing it. May I ask you and your students to be lenient, my pupils prepared rather difficult texts which they had difficulty to say, we should have worked the pronunciation longer but we did not have enough time, then when I send the video. I will send the texts as well. They have been learning English for 2 years and a half only and some of them find it a bit hard to study but they all enjoyed introducing themselves and presenting their town to you and their Indian friends.

How lucky your students are to be going for a cruise and for you to be going back to sea after 20 years. Please ask your students to tell about both their experiences of mountaineering in the Himalayas and the cruise, my pupils are looking forward to knowing about their numerous activities during these trips, it is like magic for them.

In January our exchange with Bulmershe School of Reading (UK) is starting, the English party is coming to Lusignan for 10 days and I am taking 31 to Great Britain in February and among them about 10 pupils involved in the indo-French pen friend exchange, they too will be able to tell their Indian friends about their experiences and activities shared with their English correspondents.

I do not remember if I told you but unfortunately our course is one semester only, it will come to an end on January 17th which means I will not see these pupils again except for the 3 whom I teach. During the second semester, I will work with the

pupils who are taking part in the exchange with G
B, we will work on a historical project the
Renaissance, the time of Henry VIII and

Shakespeare.

The 17 pupils involved with the pen friend exchange with India will be able to go on writing to their friends but I will not be able to guide them any longer, I hope they will feel like continuing.

I will prepare the video and send it to you very soon. Thank you so mush for your good wishes and in our turn, my students and I wish you, your family, your students and all the members of your college a very happy new year, may it be filled with numerous ious.

In this life of unknown depth, In this vision of unknown health, In this search by undefined doors, stands humanity's ladder!














THE RIMC FAMILY

SOLDIER OF FORTUNE

His grandfather, Major Shrinivas Kulkarni (Retd.), fought the Germans in the Second World War, and the Chinese in the Sino-India war of 1961. Twelve year old Rohan Kulkarni wants to emulate his grand dad's feats and is already on his way. As the only Pune student to get admission to get 27 boys batch of the prestigious



Rashtriya Indian Military College (RIMC), Rohan has beaten back thousands across the country and at least 500 boys from Maharashtra alone.

Rohan, a class VII student of the Loyola high school, will be joining the Dehra Dun – based RIMC on January 25, 2002. Rohan attributes his interest in the armed forces to the many war stories and incidents recounted by his grandfather. "My grandfather's action stories still ring in my ears. I feel it is a very exciting life and I want to be a part of it," says the energetic lad.

Interestingly, Rohan is Rajendra and Rashmi's only child and though the couple are entrepreneurs, they have been extremely encouraging about their son's fascination for the uniform. Says Rajendra, a water purification expert, "Our family has had a rich military tradition and that is why we feel happy with Rohan's decision." Rashmi, a doctorate in microbiology, says, "Rohan has been good at both sport and studies and he should do well in the forces."

The RIMC is arguably the most notable feeder institution to the National Defence Academy (NDA) in Pune and receives a batch of 27 students every six months for admissions to class VIII. The residential programme runs along military lines and educates the boys till class XII and prepares them for the NDA entrance examination. Many of the celebrated soldiers of the Indian Armed forces have been graduates of the RIMC.

Rohan, an ace swimmer, has set his sights on a career in the Indian Navy and says, "I love water and a fighting career in the navy should be very interesting." Rohan's immediate role model is another Pune boy Tejas Deshpande, who joined the RIMC six months back.

Tejas, who is in Pune on holiday told Pune Times, "The RIMC is a lot of fun. We have one student from every single state in the country and it is this cosmopolitan nature of RIMC that I like the most. Of course, as much as the lovely puddings and the cold coffee that our chefs serve us everyday."

Rohan's parents attribute his success to the guidance of senior citizens S G Ranade and his wife Mangala, who coached the boy for the RIMC examination. When contacted Mangala Ranade who says, "We are very happy about the success of both Tejas, and now Rohan. We are praying for a hattrick now!"

LIL' RIMCOS

RIMC the home for 5 yrs for these little Rimcos is where my husband got his posting in Jan '97. We were leading a quiet and complacent life admist the serene hills of Shillong. The news was overwhelming for my husband but at that period I was going through the pangs of handling a teenager male in my house. Which means I was a confused and a puzzled mother. The boy who is a gentleman till he enters his teens, becomes a total rebel and a bully - God! Where have I gone wrong? Was it in my upbringing? A thousand questions enter my mind and leave me feeling defeated. That, was the moment we were given the news of our posting to RIMC. Handling one boy was a nightmare and there I would have 250 of them on my hands. I almost screamed, for how do I handle these devils (thats what I always think of boys since I have two of my own). The most unpredictable creatures. One was always scared of even shaking hands with them for one was never sure what was behind the friendly shake - a dead insect, a sticky snail or the foul smell of a dead rat and our deadly reactions to their prank always gives them thrills.

With all these fears and ideas, we reached Dehra one fine morning. To greet us, there stood four innocent looking Rimcos. I had no choice but to put forward my hand with a broad smile. Trying to convey the message - 'please spare me' I wont harm you and you don't harm me. But at that moment there couldn't have been more gentle creatures. Being constantly on my guard I doubted their sober exterior. But then they looked so smart and confident that I had no choice but to fall for them.

The first six months I kept myself free to mix around and know them better. This was not enough. Being an Eng teacher (of only girls school) I opted to teach the 1st & 2nd termers. Having been with them ever since I realised that the root of rimcollian lies in these two classes. And let me say it with pride that the strength & bond begins here and will carry on I suppose till the end of time. Setling down, going for rounds together and leading a tough life binds close.

Teaching these young ones turned out to be such fun. In their innocence they get into a lot of pranks & mischief and I too play up with them. Behind me lies the experience bringing up of 2 boys of my own. With time I realised that boys who were shy or were not fluent in English tried to interact with me, thus learning to speak the language better. Their pranks I accept graciously and vice-versa. One night after a tiring party when we drove into our porch, we saw a huge snake '6 footer' lying there. Something about the snake gave me a feeling that it was dead. Nevertheless we stopped at a distance and cautiously went near it with a stick and to our relief it was a dead one. I knew it was nothing but the pranks of these boys and surely they would be watching us from somewhere at this late hour of the night. Early next morning I got it placed in front of class I & IA. There was no reaction from these boys the next morning and I wondered, why? The snake had already made it rounds of the dormitories before it finally reached our house last night! And the next day it found its way to most of the classes primarily to scare the staff perhaps.

Interacting with these boys I have understood what actually binds them. From the moment they step into the college the seniors become their guides and mentors and they try and follow their footsteps. When the seniors do something seriously wrong, the authorities have to take drastic measures, so that the youngsters do not follow. They are all children and the elders have to guide them. Its only those who come to live in this vast campus for a few years who will understand life at RIMC. One has to be tough and gentle at the same time. And to be tough is the most difficult task one has to face here.

I am sure these boys will realise it when they grow up to be a father.

These are the little Rimcos who pass out from here as gentle youngmen to begin a new life with such a

45th NATIONAL SHOOTING CHAMPIONSHIP COMPETITION B.S.F CSWT INDORE M.P. -2002 AND KUMAR SURENDRA SINGH MEMORIAL AIR WEAPON NATIONAL

It was for the first time in the history of RIMC that cadets qualified for the Nationals in shooting. This year it was BSF CSWT Indore who hosted the event. BSF ranges are international level ranges, which are located in Malwa known as Reoti ranges. We got our accomodation in the Bravo hostel of Central School of Weapons and Tactics, which is 16 kms from the shooting range. This competition was scheduled from 7 - 19 Jan.

Four cadets who qualified in the pre nationals held at Asansol took part in the 10 mtrs. air pistol event. The team comprised of five cadets namely cadet Anurag Shukla, Cadet Amul Saha, Cadet Maan Pratap, Cadet Ajit Singh and Cadet Abhishek Tiwari accompanied by the Shooting OIC Mr Khushi Ram.

We started off from college on 9th morning at 6 a.m. by Ujain Express and reached Ujjain the next day by 11 a.m. From Ujjain we boarded another train which took us to Indore on the station B.S.F. Jawans received us, they loaded our luggage on to a bus in which some shooters from other places were sitting. The bus took us straight to bravo hostel of CSWT. We kept our luggage in our block and after a refereshing lunch a B.S.F. Bus took us to the Reoti ranges. We all were very excited to see our A.M.U. Shooters again. They took us all around the range. We also went around in the tents that B.S.F. had put for different teams from all over the country, the full area was known as Nishanebaaj village most of the teams had opted to stay in the Alpha and Bravo hostels of CSWT.

On the first day we spent most of the time in the 10 mtrs range. We saw the senior men air rifle peep sight competition. A.M.U. shooters helped us to know some of the national and international level medal winners. We also interacted with them. This range was fully air conditioned. Next we went around seeing the events going around in 25 mtrs and 50 mtrs. After lunch we went to see the 300 mtrs range in which big boring events were in progress.

On the second day we were generally engaged in getting our weapons checked as another attracting event was the 25 mtrs rapid fire competition. The competitors were mostly of international standard. A tough competition was between Jaspal Rana and two other A.M.U shooters. No one amongst us faced any problem regarding the weapons . After that we were accompanied by Mr. V. Ganesh who is a shooter from the infantry school to famous temples in the outskirts of Indore; By 5' O Clock we were

back and joined for the practice session with other pistol shooters on the 10 mtrs. range.

On the 13th it was very important day for us as two of our shooters had the detailment in the afternoon. Commandant arrived in the forenoon and went around seeing the matches of various events. Today cadet Anurag Shukla and cadet Ajit Singh Negi tried out their fate with their 'CO-2' models. Commandant dropped us back to the C.S.W.T. hostel where we enjoyed the festival of 'Lohri' with the girls and boys of Punjab.

On 14th of Jan Cadet Amul Kumar Saha and Cadet Maan Pratap Singh Godara brought us very good news that all the cadets had made it for the 46th NSCC

It was now known that with a small practice of 5 months the cadets of RIMC even made it for the next years nationals. The commandant RIMC was very pleased by the show and hence took us all for a grand treat to 'Nakhrali Dhani' a Rajasthan resort in Indore.

ter and Mr. Sanjay Kumar as a very versatile Crafts Teacher.

Results

The motivation to join NDA is perhaps at an all time high, at an average 80 per cent of the batch strength are present in NDA.

In the Secondary School Examination held in Nov 2001, our 24 Cadets passed of which 23 passed with 1st division and one in second division. Besides an impressive all round result, we had a rich haul of 39 distinctions in various subjects, notably English.

Shooting is an expensive sport and we are most grateful to the AG who gave a grant of Rs 5 L to promote this sport.

Adventure Activities

Mountaineering has become a passion with the boys. One third of the student population are qualified on courses and proudly wear their ice axes. HMI and NIM have become vacation schools for many. This winter, two Masters and 34 Cadets did the basic course, many of them incl the Master qualified with a recommendation to do the advanced course.

Infrastructure Development

In 50 years since independence, we almost doubled our strength with only a 10% increase in buildings. This resulted in overcrowding in dorms and in classrooms, one master's bungalow began to be shared by two and so on. ages and the other still devoid of its future perfection.



A NOTE ON QUALITATIVE INDICATORS OF PERFORMANCE FOR PERMANENT RIMC TEACHERS

RIMC is a premier educational institution in the country. For almost eighty years, the college has been preparing Indians for leadership in the armed forces. It has fulfilled this task with outstanding success. It has continuously produced officers who have displayed awesome courage and valour in the call of duty and the nation's service.

This has been primarily because of the unique, intensive life and ethos of the college. For five years, the cadets are subjected to academic work, physical exertion, sports, strict discipline, and dormitory living. They are from every part of the country and from diverse social, economic, ethnic and religious backgrounds. They live amidst a vast, serene natural setting. All combines to instil powerful and enduring qualities, capabilities and strengths to the cadets.

It is this context that must inform and inspire the work of new permanent teaching entrants to the RIMC community. And it is this larger process of self – development guide the work of the most critical pat of this institution, i.e. the permanent teachers. They are the cement holding the institution together.

Ideally, evaluation would mean a process of critical self-assessment, towards self-improvement within the institution's value framework.

No one else (who interacts closely with the cadets everyday) remains in the institution for long periods, thus ensuring continuity of the mission. Each new entrant is thus charged with the responsibility of rapidly identifying with and imbibing the values of the institution, and becoming an effective means for their inculcation in the cadets.

Working in RIMC has of necessity almost therefore to be an inspired process. The teacher must see the place as sacred, and working here must therefore be like prayer and devout service.

There has to be a sense of reverence for the institution (in its abstract, invisible, ongoing sense), accompanied by a self-annihilating / celebratory sense of gratitude for the opportunity to be in RIMC. This serves as the foundation of an all-out immersion, exertion and perseverance. The person



is called upon to rise, in his own sense of self first, and thus be an invaluable source of inspiration for young minds and hearts. A sense of commitment and deep maturity ensure that it is the underlying and abiding values rather than day-to-day difficulties, events and circumstances that dominate the consciousness.

With the institution aiming at the all-round development of the cadets, and the all-round development of their personalities, it is essential that

the staff are also well-rounded – in terms of faculties, capabilities, activities. This means that coming to RIMC can act as a trigger for this development in the staff member, which he in turn becomes a means to transmit.

There must be objective assessment of the teacher's grasp over the subject taught; his skills of communication, especially in English; the quality of the teaching; his effectiveness in following and completing the curriculum; the soundness of students' learning and comprehension. The teacher has to take responsibility for the comprehension of each student, and especially the so-called weak ones.

The teacher has to display and demonstrate ongoing self-learning and especially the so-called weak ones.

Sagacious reference could also be made to the cadets' general – and varying – perception of and attitude towards the staff member.

While this forms the core of the teacher's role he is also called upon to play an extra – curricular role. Here the focus is on the extent of his involvement, his motivation, attitude and specific tasks and activities undertaken. Again, the relationship to cadets is important – not simply in terms of so – called popularity, but effective guidance. A person may be unpopular because he does not allow anyone to shirk his responsibility. That may therefore suggest the teacher's success rather than failure.

In the classroom and outside, the use of RIMC resources for educational purposes – ranging from teaching aids, to the natural settings – is something

to stress upon.

The teacher is also called upon to exercise a strong positive influence upon the cadets, and thus mould their personalities. An orientation for cadet counselling is essential.

The embracing by the teacher of a sense of responsibility and ownership (of the institution and its values, of its routine, of specific) is perhaps the most vital factor.

Other necessary qualities are: judiciousness in speech, behavior and conduct, and thus setting correct examples; displaying maturity and responsibility; diligence, patience, and above all integrity. Willingness to learn, improve and grow. Sensitive, perceptive, discerning and self-correction. Meticulous and particular, as opposed to sloppy and callous. Smart and clean in attire, turn-out, as opposed to slovenly, shabby, untidy. Broad-minded, tolerance and respect for others. Appropriate behavior and attitude to seniors, peers, and juniors. Teams-manship is vital, since the institution functions as one large

Every person has his own temperament, nature and style. Someone may be more demonstrative, someone else more quiet; someone very dynamic and innovative someone else more diligent and attentive to ordinary things. The point is for a unique and positive style to emerge.



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Editorial



beauty and captured it in our cameras. We enjoyed the folk dance of the natives. Next





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

While delivering his thoughts on the topic, Dr Chilana emphatically stressed on need for the In Service Education of teachers in implementing value oriented teaching. He said that the, In Service Education and Training (INSAT) will play a strategic role in providing quality education. The areas specified by him for professional growth of teachers were as follows:-

- 1. Quality Education
- 2. Value Education
- 3. Technology Education
- 4. Modern Management Techniques
- 5. Teacher as Counsellor
- 6. Parents Education
- 7. Planning
- 8. Action Research
- 9. Comprehensive and Continuous growth.

His talk also highlighted the school based methods and self motivated approaches like independent reading, original writing, self evaluation and action research for regeneration of teacher's knowledge and growth.

His most cherished point of action was "Life Long Education" and he focussed on assisting teachers in their "Consciousness Raising".

According to him:-

"The 'WORLD' is a great important book, and 'LIFE' is a great teacher" (as you learn from life). So read the world, accept it, and change it where you can.

This workshop was attended by all the members of 'Teaching Faculty'. During the workshop, teachers asked questions, reported what they read and actively participated in group discussions, while expressing their conviction about 'Once a teacher, always a student'. They unanimously demanded that such programmes should be held regularly.

Dr. Chilana has been a distinguished Professor of Education in the NCERT and Deputy Education Advisor in the Ministry of HRD, Govt of India, besides many feathers to his cap. He is at present Professor and Head of 'Teacher Growth Point'.


STOP PRESS :





A TRIBUTE TO AN ILLUSTRIOUS RIMCOLLIAN

The crown of achievements that RIMC wears is engraved with three scintillating gems who have been the Chiefs of Army Staff. Amongst them is one of the most ardent Rimcollians and illustrious Generals _ Late Gen G G Bewoor. No RIMC publication can ever be completed without a tribute to his now departed soul.

The son of an Indian Civil Servant - Gen Bewoor joined RIMC in 1928 in the Kitchner Section following the footsteps of his elder brother _ MG Bewoor (who later laid down his life in the Arakan battle in Burma in 1944 as a Major). An excellent cricketer and a hockey player - he passed out of the College as the Cadet Captain in 1934.

He was commissioned into the Baluch Regiment and after partition, he joined the Dogras. He was the Colonel Commandant of the Dogra Regiment. Prominent amongst the various assignments he held before becoming the COAS were Director General of Military Trainign (DGMT); Deputy Chief of Army Staff from 15 Jan 1973-31 May 1975. During his glorious career he was awarded the PVSM and later the Padma Shri.

He was an ardent Rimcollian and the first Hony Secretary of the Old Boys Association. His family has been deeply involved with RIMC. His two sons and a nephew joined RIMC. His sons passed out as Cadet Captains and joined the Air Force. All of them were in the Kitchner Section.

Gen Bewoor visited RIMC in the Re-union of 1989 - hale, hearty and steady. He was a source of inspiration for all cadets with his achievements - greater than anybody else's. His sudden demise on 23 Oct 89 shocked and grieved all of us at RIMC. May the new generation of cadets attain similar heights in success in all fields.


life? If you can say, "Yes" to these four questions, you are on your way to higher consciousness and to mastering the most important lessons of this Gemini grand allignment.



RIMC EXPEDITION CONQUERS MT JOGIN - III

The Rashtriya Indian Military College expedition to Mt Jogin - III (6116M/ 20387 ft) in Garhwal Himalayas was flagged off by Commandant, RIMC on 26 May 2002. The team comprised of 22 members, which included two officers, one doctor, one JCO, one NCO, one Master, 11 cadets and others.

The team left Dehradun on 26th May and reached NIM Uttarkashi by bus the same evening. On the following day the party reached Gangotri, where they acclimatized. On 30th May they moved from Gangotri and reached Bhuj Kharak which is at a height of 12000 ft. On 31st May, they staged forward to Kedar Kharak (height 14000 ft). On 01st June, they reached Kedar Tal the base camp (height 16000 ft) where acclimatization and training continued for four days. Despite inclement weather, the team moved to Advance Base Camp - I (height 17000 ft) on 06th June.

On the following day the weather turned more hostile but the leader Capt SP Consul of NDA, Khadakwasla and the Deputy Leader Capt Vivek Singh took the bold decision to carry on regardless of the weather. The team ultimately established Camp II on 07th June. At Camp II preparation for final assault was carried out in great detail. On 08th June, the final assault on the peak started at 0300hrs. On 09th June, with the increase in height, the climb became more arduous. The final leg was toughest of all wherein, the team had to move for almost two hours before reaching the summit. A total of two officers, one NCO, 10 cadets and two guides reached the top on 09th June at 0615hrs. The youngest member of the team was Cadet Gaurav Hridaya (thirteen plus) who also acheived the distinction of having set foot on the summit. On their return journey the team was given a warm reception by NIM, Uttarkashi on 12th June 2002.

The expedition was flagged in by His Excellency Sardar Surjit Singh Barnala at the Raj Bhavan on 14th June. The Governor also hosted a high tea for the young cadets and congratulated the members of the expedition for their courage in taking up the challenge of mountaineering so early in life.

Roop Kund Trek A Report

A group of 38 Cadets accompained by three masters embarked upon the Roopkund Trek on 29th May, 2002.

We left RIMC at 0700 hrs and reached Rudraprayag at 1430 hrs. At Rudraprayag we made an overnight halt at the Hotel Monaal, where the food and stay was excellent. In the evening we visited-Koteshwar Mahadev and the Temple at Sangam (Alaknanda and Mandakini) where we enjoyed the turbulent joining of both the rivers.

The next day we left Rudraprayag at 0730 hrs and after a monotonous uphill journey reached the base camp at Lohanjung at 1630 hrs, situated at a height of 7800 ft. Lohanjung is a pass separating Kumaon Himalayas from the Garhwal Himalayas. There we were welcomed by Mr Tej Bir Singh, camp leader who briefed us about camp rules and the trekking programme. At 1750 hrs we went for a 6 km acclimatization walk to Ajung Top (8500 ft). After dinner, Cadets joined the Camp-fire and impressed all the other groups/campers with their songs and jokes.

Next day, we left the base camp at 0730hrs for the first day's trek of 9 Km. descending down to the bridge at the river Neel-Ganga and then rising steadily to village Didana. We arrived at Camp I (9500 ft) a little away from village Didana at 1300 hrs and were

welcomed by Mr Amit, the camp leader, who briefed us about the day's programme.

On 1st June 2002 (Saturday), we left camp at 0730 hrs and after trekking the steady ascent through the dense rain forest of Tolpani for 8 kms reached Camp II at Ali Bugyals (12500 ft). There Mr Dinesh Thakur, welcomed us and briefed us about further programme.

Ali Bugyals are breath-taking Alpine grass lands which offer stunning and everchanging landscapes between the snow and vegetation lines from where one can get a clear and fascinating view of the major Garhwal and Kumaon peaks such as Mt Trishul, Mt Mektol, Mt Mrigtheni, Mt Chaukhamba, Mt Nanda Ghunti, Mt Neelkanth, Mt Bandar Poonch, Mt Jogin I, Mt Jovelin and Mt Dunagiri. The weather was inclement at Camp II due to incessant hail and sleet storms coupled with strong

winds and temperature dropping to subzero at night.

Next day was Sunday. We left for BedniKund at 0830 hrs and reached there at 0930 hrs. After offering prayer at Bednikund which is also a source of River Neel Ganga, we took the Roopkund trail and trekked steadily along the inclined stretch of 11 kms up to Ghora Rock, 2 kms short of the uninhabited village of Bagua Bassa (14,300 ft) [Roopkund is just 4 kms away from Bagua Bassa]. The group had to return from Ghola Rock due to

hostile terrain and the visibility being very poor due to dense fog.

Next day we left the Camp II at 0800hrs and traversed 9 kms downhill through the forest of Ghairoli Patal descending steeply to the river Neel Ganga and then rising steeply again to Ranki Dhar (9000 ft), the venue of Camp III. We arrived at Camp III at 1300 hrs and were taken care of by Bunty, the camp leader who briefed us about the day's programme.

Perched on the ridge overlooking the village Wan, Camp III unfolded the panoramic view of the village below, spread over an area of 8 sq kms amidst verdant splendour. We visited the Temple of Latto (village deity) late in the evening.

Next day we trekked 13kms back to the base camp at Lohanjung. The last 2kms being uphill from the river Neel Ganga. The group came back to the base camp at 1330 hrs and made an overnight halt.

On 5th June 2002(Wednesday) at 0730 hrs, the group departed from the base camp to the onward destination and after the lunch, enroute at the Hotel Monaal (Rudraprayag),

arrived at the college campus at 2230 hrs, tired, but exhilarated with cherishable memories of a wonderful experience.

The trekking route (distance wise) and lodging / boarding was perfectly planned by the organisers. i.e. Holiday Moods Adventure India Ltd. The Cadets enjoyed Chinese, South Indian and Continental delicacies which were catered to them at the camps. Our group was adjudged by the organisers as the most disciplined and punctual group which covered distances in record time and as a complete group and reached the highest spot. Throughout the expedition, trekking was carried out amidst lush green dense vegetation - flora and fauna, rich and diverse. We were in the lap of nature! Rainforests comprising of species such as Rhododendrons, Silver Oak, Deodar, Pine, etc. We were followed by breathtaking alpine grasslands called Bugyals. Camp fires, PT and games for keeping fit in adverse and hostile climate and interaction with local inhabitants were good fun. In the final analysis, worth one week of vacation time.

His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales said during his inaugral address, "from my own experience, I may say that it is the first few blows on the anvil of life that give the human weapon the set and temper which carries it through life's battles". Those who are responsible for the administration of this school have been paying special attention to see that the spirit of the public Schools of England to foster the fine old Indian Quintessance of "Mutual reverence which bind together the guru and the chela."

The Victoria cross was instituted in January 1856, and until March, 1942, was struck from the metal of guns captured by the British at Sebastopot during the Crimean war. In 1911 the right to receive the Victoria Cross was extended to Indian Soldiers, the simple bronze medal is worn before all the other decorations.

When laying the foundation stone of the National Defence Academy at Khadakvasla, Prime Minister Nehru said "We want to make India A-1 and a first rate Country in every kind of Activity. For this we must aim at the highest and best in everything and specially in the 'Army, Navy and Airforce'. The best in the Armed forces can be achieved only with a good and sound foundation at the pre-cadet stage, and the Sainik School (Old Name of RIMC) at Dehradun endeavours to do so."

1978, 1980 and 1996.


2. Chronicles : 1972 to 1977, 1986 to 1996 and 1999.

CHEERS!






Inter - School Squash Tournament

OBITUARY





"Kanya: Care for the Girl Child"

25th August (Day 1)

It was a cold morning. All were sleeping. I woke up and started to change. By 7.00 am I reached the mess. All of us were fully packed. We boarded the truck after a rushed breakfast and headed towards the Bus Stand. We were 8 cadets and 1 escort. We reached Shimla by 5.30pm, and were welcomed very warmly with tea at BCS. We rested in their Guest House and had a lavish dinner along with the boys of Welham School.

26th August (Day 2)

That day we shifted to different rooms and dorms. The whole programme started by 3.30 pm. All the delegates appeared and we had an ice-breaking session. We were sorted into groups called tribes and we mixed up with other school boys and girls. It was great fun. We had tea and kept chatting with other children.

27th August (Day 3)

We woke up early and changed into mufti. After a lavish breakfast we had a formal Chapel service and then an 'Inauguration Ceremony'. We all had introduced ourselves and sung the song "This land is your land". Our song was probably the best as everyone was singing it after they left the hall. After a tea break, we had a very informative presentation by Mrs Jennifer Nandi (actually all of us were dozing off one by one). It was about the changing landforms, Himalayas and the connection of Himalayas with Kanya, the girl child. Later, that evening we had our first formal tribal meeting. We discussed certain topics like Mrs Nandi's talk, the lack of education and the problems of the girl child. It was quite fruitful. We then had a debriefing session. Each tribe told the audience about what they had discussed. We were also briefed about the next day's trip to Nauradhar, a village near Shimla. That night we slept early.

28th August (Day 4)

We got up early, changed and got into Sumos. We left by 7.00 am and reached Nauradhar by 1.30 in the afternoon. The children welcomed us by serving soft drinks and putting teekas on our fore head, which touched our heart. A 5-star camp was already set up. So we didn't have to do much hard work. After a hearty lunch we went to every child's house which was quite far away, so all the food was digested. We kept asking questions about their daily life and they surprisingly, didn't hesitate to answer. We observed that all of them loved studying. After a long trek we met a type of village headman, a 115 years old woman and a man who had done more than 10 types of jobs. We interviewed them and found that everything was normal. We also ate some local dishes called 'ashkill'. The day ended with all of us having walked a lot.

29th August (Day 5)

This morning we put our minds together, a village child or two with each of us, and put our imaginations on a chart paper. As each of them drew it, I realized all had loved their school

Our ideas were quite similar. We had a cultural programme that evening. It contained our dramas, plays, dances and some local music, followed by a debriefing session about the next day. Before sleeping the local music was sounding in my ears.

30th August (Day 6)

We got up in a hurry and packed up very quickly. After having breakfast in a hurry we were off. We saw many beautiful streams and water falls on the way. We reached Shimla at lunch time and had a hearty meal after which we went to the mall. This was the most disappointing part as we got only Rs 100/- as pocket money. How could we expect to have a good time with Rs. 100/- in our pocket in a mall like of Shimla. I felt very embarrassed in front of other schools. Well! after returning we prepared a drama in 5 minutes called "Roadpati se Crorepati". Ours was the funniest and the most comical presentation. That night we were invited to a jam session. It was fun.

31st August (Day 7)

This was 'the end' for some schools. We had a final presentation in which we summed up a total of the conference. After which we had a very lavish and rich lunch. We were all presented with bags and T-shirts. All the schools left by 7.00 pm except for us. We kept loitering in the school. We had dinner there itself.

1st September (Day 8)

Our bus was at 9.15 am. After breakfast we met Brig Gill, a Rimcollian, he was a very pleasant person. Our return journey was a bit better than the one we had gone in. We returned to the college by 7.30 pm.

I would like to conclude by saying "It was good, but it could have been better by a bit more pocket money and a more comfortable transport".





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RIMC SQUASH TEAM - QUATERLY COMPETITIONS

Squash has always been a part and parcel of life at RIMC and the two squash trips made by the squash team to the BCS, Shimla and the Mayo College, Ajmer prove this.

After the conclusion of the RIMC Inter Section Squash Cup, the team, selected on the basis of their performance in the competition, started practice for the tournament scheduled to start in Shimla on the 9th of August. This was an invitational tournament organized by the Bishop Cotton School. Our team participated in three categories namely U-13, U-15 and U-17. The main reason for sending the U-13 team, even though they were inexperienced was the exposure. They are the building blocks of the future Squash team and will have gained a lot from the experience. They played very well, considering that they were just beginners and even won matches against reputed players. However, a team effort was needed and the team comprised of Alex Lalmuanpiua, S. Bhargav and Ankur Tiwari were placed sixth.

Our U-15 team however, lived up to expectations and bagged the runners-up trophy. The team comprising **Abishek Rana, Sharyf Bhonsle** and **Suraj Aiyappe** won three of their four matches against the Laurence School, Sanawar; Bishop Cotton School, Simla and the Welham Boys School, Dehradun. We lost only to a resistant Y.P.S., Mohali team.

In the U-17 category, the most competitive category there were only two other teams and we played BCS Shimla and the Lawrence School. The performance of Cadet P. Tomar against opponents seeded nationally must be given special mention. He gave both teams a run for their money before, eventually, going down. Cadets Ashok Garg and I. Sharan were the other members and the latter won a match against Lawrence Sanawar. On the whole we performed well in this tournament.

Our second tournament was the All India Inter School finals in Ajmer. This prestigious tournament was held from the 8th to the 12th of September. Our new entrants to the U-13 team were the first termers **Vinayak Gupta** and **Yogesh Kumar**. **Cadet Alex** remained the top seed. He performed well but needed support from the other two to win against a team, Even then the first termers played very well considering that they picked up the game just a month before. The team came up fourth in their pool.

The U-15 team was placed in Pool A with Mayo College 'A', Army School, Devyali, Nasik and the Welham Boys, Dehradun. We were runners-up in our group beating Welham Boys and the Army School and qualified for the semifinal against Daly College. We lost to them but not without a fight. In the third place playoff yet again with the Y.P.S. Mohali, we played well but did not win against nationally seeded players. We ended up fourth out of 8 teams. The team comprising Cadets A. Rana, S. Bhonsle and A. Shahi.

Our U-17 matches were in a round robin format and we won our matches, against the HR College, Bombay and La Martinere, Calcutta. Again, Cadet Pratap Tomar showed composure against the Mayo College, winning his match. He battled it out with his Daly College appointment but finally lost in the end. The team of N. Ghildyal, S. Aiyappa was placed third. In the end I would like to acknowledge the efforts of our OIC Mr. S. K. Mishra, coach Mr. Vijay Jangla and Capt Vivek Singh, our AAO for restoring the reputation of our college in the field of Squash. If we continue this way, with the support of the administration, we are sure we can bring back the glorious days of RIMC squash and better our reputation on the National Squash scene.

RIMC Co-operative Society

Initially the employees of RIMC were in the habit of taking loans from local shops around the school for fulfilling their monetory needs owing to marriages and sundries. In the process they always shunned banks due to cumbersome procedures for taking loans coupled with their ignorance. Consequent upon this the co-operative society was started in the year 1957 by the late Lt Col Mamgain, the then Adm Officer, under registration no. 563 dated 26-3-57, to facilitate quick and easy loans along with small savings and term deposits. The society closed down in 1991.

In Nov 1997 it was desired by the employees that this society should be revived for their welfare and following the initiative taken by Mr C L Pandita in pursuing the matter, the sanction of Deputy Registrar of UP Co-operative Societies (Pauri Garhwal) was accorded on 21-9-98. A loan ceiling of Rs. 40 thousand per member was sanctioned and Sh Daya Ram Chauhan, Sh A S Ahuja and Sh C L Pandita were elected as the President, Vice-president and Secretary of the society respectively.

A sum of Rs. 15 lakh were given on loan to 43 members between Nov 98 to Feb 99. The interest rates offered are one of the best 14-16% on loans and 12% on deposits. The Strength of members has risen ever since to 135, which includes masters and officers of RIMC. Credibly not a single person has defaulted and even a widow (member) has payed all her dues. It has indeed benefitted a lot of people. The present status of share money is Rs. 4 lakh approx. which has deposits worth Rs. 16 lakhs. A dividend of 16% has been given to its members on shares for the year 2001-2002.
