



Redefining Temerity

Mountaineering is an integral part of activities at the RIMC. The cadets take keen interest in mountaineering by going for various adventure courses at NIM, Uttarkashi; HMI Darjeeling; JIM,Pahalgam(J&K). Cadets have also scaled 9 peaks, some of which are Mt Banderpunch, Mt Deo-Tibba, etc. The names of RIMC cadets find a mention in the Limca Book of World Records.

31 cadets of RIMC successfully completed their Basic Mountaineering Course from ABVIMAS (Atal Bihari Vajpayee Institute of Mountaineering & Allied Sports), Manali as a prelude to their next mountaineering expedition to Mt Srikanth (6133 meters).

The cadets started off with rock-climbing in the rocks of the Pir-Panjal Range. This was accompanied by rope-knot practice, jumaring and abseiling. After the rock-craft, the cadets proceeded for Solang (8,500 ft.) where the cadets trekked to Mt Patalsu (12,600 ft), enjoying the first glimpse of the snow covered patch. This was followed by camping at Dhundhi (9,000 ft). The cadets practised the techniques of snow-craft and ice-craft at Panchlni Thatch (10,000 ft). The cadets also trekked to Bakarthatch (10,700 ft), near Baes Glacier which is the permanent Base Camp of ABVIMAS. The cadets trekked for almost 150 kms in the 26-day course and the best part of the whole training was that all the 31 cadets successfully summitted Mt Balchandran (15,050 ft) during the last part of the training that was elevation-gaining.

With this, the cadets successfully acquired the five most essential skills required for mountaineering - Trekking, Rock-craft, Snow-craft, Ice-craft and Elevation-gaining.

The cadets also got the opportunity to meet Mr Rajeev Sharma, Deputy-Director, ABVIMAS, a renowned mountaineer and Dicky Dolma, both of them being Everesters.

The team was accompanied by Mr Sanjay Kumar, an experienced mountaineer who has already summitted five peaks in the Garhwal region and one in the Dhauladhar range above 6,000 meters.

Colonel PK Kumaria Commandant RIMC, appreciated the efforts of the cadets and extended best wishes for the future expeditions.



Training Visit to Andaman Islands

On 2 June 2011, 25 cadets accompanied by Hav Jagwinder Singh and Lt Col A Tewari left for Vishkapatnam. The cadets reached Vishakapatnam on 4 June. They were taken to INS Magar, which was to be their accommodation. The next day, the cadets visited INS Satvahana, which is a submarine school and an escape training school. Here the cadets learnt the features of a submarine and various methods to escape from it. Then they visited INS Jalashva. They also visited INS Kursura, a submarine museum. The dawn of 6 June 2011 marked the beginning of the journey to Andaman Islands. The cadets were fortunate to see a helicopter landing on the board of the ship. To keep the cadets busy, a visit was organised to the bridge, where they learnt about many naval systems. Finally, on 9 June the ship reached the harbour in Port Blair. The cadets were then escorted to Dweepika Auditorium, where they were shown a movie on Andaman & Nicobar Islands. Then they visited the Floating Dockyard Repair Centre. Later, the cadets made a visit to the famous Cellular Jail where they were shown the Light and Sound Show. The next day, they visited the Birchgunj Military Station, where the cadets got the chance to experience a BMP ride. This was followed by visits to Anthropological Museum, Samudrika Museum, Sagarika Museum (Handloom Centre), the famous Ross Island and Corby's Cone Beach. On 11 June, INS Magar departed from Port Blair for Vizag. Again the cadets witnessed Helo landing. The 13th of June had adventure in store for us. As a cyclone was approaching and the ship was headed in that direction, the route was changed to avoid the cyclone. That day the ship went through the rolling and pitching of the sixth intensity but the RIMCOS calmly sustained them. The cadets finally heaved a sigh of relief on the evening of 14 June, after safely reaching the port in Vizag. On 15 June, the cadets made a visit to INS Kalinga, which has a missile storage centre and a MARCO (Marine Commando) training school. There they were shown a movie on MARCOS and a weapon display. The cadets also went to Kailashgiri and Rishikonda beach. In the evening, a RIMCO- RIMCOLLIAN get-together was organised at the Naval Officers' Institute. On the last day, the cadets visited Borra Caves. 17 June marked the end of the course with the cadets proceeding for their vacations. During this visit, the cadets learnt many new things about the Indian Navy and many were also motivated to join the Naval Forces

The Legend Lives On.....



The doyen of education and erudition, Mr RC Singhal, breathed his last on the 6th of August, 2011. With his passing away, an era has come to an end - an era of 36 years of devoted, self-less and unobtrusive service to the RIMC. An epitome of dedication and ineffable commitment, this 85 year old savant has left a deep void never to be filled. For him, education was not a profession but a mission to sculpt Officers, Brigadiers and Generals- each one a 'magnum opus'- sculpted out of his inchoate self.

In the year 1948, a young graduate joined the then Prince of Wales Royal Indian Military College, Dehradun. He was one of the five Indian teachers who replaced the British Masters. He served the Rashtriya Indian Military College, India's most prestigious Military School, with great distinction for 36 years. That was Mr RC Singhal. He was in the distinguished company of men like

Mr Hugh Catchpole and EJ Watson, the legendary figures in the history of military and English public school education

Mr Singhal went to the United States as Fulbright scholar and taught Maths to Senior Secondary classes and returned with a degree in school administration and organization from John Hopkins University, Baltimore. He was selected by the British Council in India to undergo an extensive training at the Institute of Education, University of London. He also held Masters and training degrees

from Allahabad University. He became almost an institution at Rashtriya Indian Military College, Dehradun. He served the College as a teacher, Section-Master and Vice Principal. He sent 72 batches to the National Defence Academy, Khadakwasla, Pune and had the rare credit for having had a hand in shaping the destiny of nearly 1200 Officers who joined the Armed Forces in India. Among his students who have held very high ranks in the Defence Services and won many gallantry awards are the former Chiefs of the Army and Air Staff.

Mr Singhal authored five books; one of them bears the title - 'Brain Teasers for Seniors'. The book was published by the Macmillan & Co. and has been used by schools in India since 1966.

Mr Singhal was:

- Past President of the Council Schools Principals' Association Dehradun.
- Past President of the Doon Mathematics Society as well as of the Doon Organization of Science Teachers
- Member, Advisory Committee, Kendriya Vidyalaya Sangathan.
- Member, Governing Body of Delhi Public School, Ghaziabad.
- Member, Governing Body of Kendriya Vidyalaya, Birpur.

Mr Singhal did a commendable job as the Principal of Cambrian Hall a prestigious, English Medium Day-cum-Residential School with a strength of about 1800 boys and girls drawn from all parts of India as well as overseas. Besides being a worthy teacher and a successful administrator, Mr Singhal was actively involved in social service. A Rotarian of over forty years standing, he was the President of the Rotary Club, Dehradun during the year 1973-74. Mr Singhal, during 63 years of his service to the youth of the country, excelled as an ambassador and diplomat with a seriousness of purpose,

sincerity, intellect, initiative and enthusiasm for every assignment he undertook

In his condolence message, Col Pankaj K Kumaria, Commandant, RIMC said : "Truly an evolved spirit and a man of substance, Mr Singhal- larger than life icon, rose above all predilections to don the mantle of a true alchemist.

Today, overwhelmed with grief, the entire RIMC and Rimcollian fraternity, bows in deference to this PHENOMENON with whom the bond only grows stronger with each passing moment-never to be severed.
