

Incidents like beheading of the two soldiers on the LOC and the gruesome manner in which a girl is sexually assaulted has shocked and anguished all Indians. But despite everything that has happened and all the responses that have come; there is a strange omission.

While the Common call it corruption, our leaders are adamant on proving it to be a slow strategic move for justice and what is even more sad is that Prime Minister Dr. Manmohan Singh, who has been a determined votary of better ties with Pakistan and who once spoke about breakfast in Lahore and lunch in Kabul has now started competing with BJP leader Sushma Swaraj in playing to the gallery. His statement that "it cannot be business as usual with Pakistan" is word for word a total contradiction of his own self.

Presently what India is facing is a condition of utter chaos and turmoil where there is no evading the fact that despite all sorts of upliftment programs and schemes, the only sufferer of the constant hike in fuel and food prices is the lower middle class Indian.

Ours is an ironically diverse country where we have a generation that condemns corruption and another that think it to be its responsibility and honour to indulge in it. On the one hand we talk about eradicating social evils and on the other we are the sole representatives of Khap Panchayats, ready to fall to any limits in case something is said against the will of our sect. People are unable to admit that they are now living in a brutalized society where their children are growing up to become amoral machines of violence. Just to borrow a term from the medical profession, we are in the middle of what doctors call the golden hour, the first hour after a road accident, in which there is a possibility of setting things right for the victim. Get it wrong now and it can only get worse from here.

with Cadet Captain Ligang Kobing

Cadets Watandeep Singh Sidhu and Manvendra Dubey interviewed the Cadet Captain on his iconic triumphs in various fields. We bring to you an excerpt:

WSS: Winning two gold medals in the recently held Dehradun District Athletic Meet was a great landmark achievement for you. So, whom do you hold responsible for making an athlete out of you?

CC: It were the seniors who recognized my talent. I first tried for short sprints. I was not very good at it. 
MD: Who has been your role model if we talk about athletics?

CC: I would give all the credit to the Team for our success.

They were always there for practice; they worked very hard and were never half hearted while doing it.

WSS: There must have been a time when you lost. How did you cope with loss?

CC: My biggest loss was when I lost in X-country in my Class IV. I had done a lot better during practices but on the last day, my timing fell short of my expectations. But I never took it as a setback. I never thought of it again but always thought of what was to be done next.

MD: What advice would you give to the budding athletes of the College?

They should see in what field are they good at and practise hard for it. They should make the most of what is available to them. The seniors should pass their skills to their juniors and try to motivate them as much as possible.

experience for the cadets. They also met a Rimcollian posted there who motivated them to join the Navy.






Welham Girls Lift Inter School Kashi Naresh Trophy



Assam Valley continued their attack but could not find the net due to the brilliant goalkeeping by the Vasant Vallley goalkeeper.




