

THE VERDANT ABODE

It's been two years that I have spent here in this lovely, wonderful campus flourishing with greenery in most of its 138 acres. Large varieties of flora and fauna can be seen in this huge campus of my Alma Matter.

The environment takes precedence over all else. It is essential for the Administration to keep the cadets fit and healthy. Our campus has a large variety of trees, some of them being rarely seen in the Doon Valley. One of them is the 'Indian Hollock tree' which can be seen in the parking area of the Academic Block. It is a gigantic tree and an abode for God's tiny creatures. It is believed to be the oldest tree in our campus.


One of the most valuable trees of India - 'Rosewood' or 'Kalashisham' can be seen in the area near the War Memorial. As stated by plant cultivators - one fully grown Rosewood tree would cost around Rs 2 lakhs to 3 lakhs. Cycas (Male and Female), a very slow growing tree can be spotted beside the Main Office of the College. According to the botanists, the estimated cost of this tree is Rs 1.5 lakhs to 2 lakhs.

We have a vast variety of fauna too in our campus. Now a days, a leopard too has been spotted in our campus. During cold winter evenings, jackals and foxes are very common in the area near Patiala Pavilion, Thimayya Auditorium and the Drill Ground.

Civet, an animal which looks almost like a mongoose but has a height equivalent to that of a cat, was very common in our campus. It used to stay in the space between the false ceiling and roofs in almost all the buildings of the RIMC, but is disappearing at a very alarming rate. As Mr PK Sharma, our dedicated environmentalist says, "Civets were found in huge numbers in the campus of the RIMC. At night, we were not able to sleep due to the racket created by these animals on the roofs of the houses, but now they've almost disappeared from our campus. One of the key reasons is the old roofs being replaced by the new tin roofs which are very hard to break or make a hole in."

As our modern ways of living are destroying the habitats of flora and fauna which are considered to be the 'beauty of the earth', we must work towards conserving them by creating artificial habitats. If we do so, only then will RIMC remain a haven for

Then came the day when we were supposed to go - the 10 of February, 2014. After breakfast, the whole College assembled and was asked, 'who all want to go to meet Ruskin?' 95 eager hands shot up in the air. We were informed that we would be leaving at exactly 1500 hrs.

At the said time, everyone assembled in front of the anterooms in their best of kits Excitement filled the atmosphere. In each hand was

clutched a book, written by Ruskin Bond. The ultimate objective was to get it autographed by him.

So, I gave it away to an old friend who kept it out in the verandah.

Amongst all the curricular and extracurricular activities taught at RIMC, character building and inculcation of leadership qualities are the hallmark of our school. Remember the first day of school how the Cadet Captain, Section Commander, Cadet NCOs and the Cadet Guardian were all actively involved in welcoming a new cadet and his family putting them at ease and conducting them around the campus. This inculcated good conduct, developed leadership traits, initiative and interactive skills besides instilling a sense of pride in our School.

I remember 03 Aug. 1977, when I joined the RIMC. Cadet Captain SK Saxena and Cadet Section Cdr GS Bains (Ranjit Section) welcomed my father and me, indicating that I would be College No 1019 and in Ranjit Section. Incidentally the Cadet Captains those days were in rotation. Of course, there was the Commandant, Col GPS Waraich, Adminstrative Officer, Maj RTC Gohain, our VP, Mr RC Singhal and my Section Master. Mr GS. Bisht, first. This was followed by

my Dormitory Commander, Prem Prakash and my Cadet Guardian, Ramachandran Santosh Nair taking over, who then conducted us around and helped us with the initial formalities. I also remember a football match between Class I and Class IA, followed by high tea, after which our parents left... and of course our first 'Roll Call' the same evening.

I can go on and on about my first day as also my first term but I would like to narrate two incidents in my first term that truly epitomized strength of

GS Bains, Section Commander, Ranjit, was caught going on 'FL' (or 'cutting bounds'). The next day during Assembly, the Commandant, Colonel GPS Waraich took up the incident and lambasted GS Bains. He spoke of the wrong that Bains had done and that he was unworthy to hold the appointment of Cadet Section Commander. Cadet Section Commander. GS Bains promptly got up from his chair in front of the Section, took off his tabs, kept them on the podium at

the feet of the Commandant and went right to the rear, the very last row, to sit with the rest of Class V and Class VA.

Now that is Character - Your Commandant chides you, that you are undeserving of the appointment you hold and you take responsibility for your action and accept the consequence, without any formal declaration of the punishment. And mind you, this was a 16 year old.

Admirable of the Commandant too, who displayed great wisdom and sagacity in accepting the young Cadet's action. One could have reacted egoistically or taunted the young Cadet with a 'How dare you move' and made an issue out of it.

A second incident relates to yours truly. One morning, I had a severe stomach ache and had reported my condition to my Dormitory Commander, Prem Prakash. I was told to report sick. The doctor, Mr Bhatti, gave me some medicines and sent me back for duty (classes).

Although I was still in pain, there

is only so much an eleven year old can say. And the good Doctor must have seen umpteen stomach aches to give them any greater value than a few medicines and an 'Attend Classes'. At the end of the games period, when Prem Prakash returned to the Junior Dormitory, he saw me sitting on my bed, crying. He realised that this did not seem like the infamous stomach ache that one normally encounters in boarding schools (or even at home as parents) and took me back to the doctor. Dr Jagat Singh Bhatti reiterated that he had given me medicines and that I would be okay. I was surprised to see Prem Prakash sternly advising the doctor 'Please look at the boy again or I am taking him to the Commandant'. Doctor Bhatti relented and checked me out again. Small wonder then, I was quickly despatched to the Military Hospital, Dehra Dun and operated for Appendicitis the same night. Again, it is a boy of 16 who displayed strength of character to assume responsibility and fearlessly speak up for what he believed was right.

There are many more stories that display character and our school instills these values in us without many of us even realising it. I chose these two incidents as these did leave a major impression on me. And when I look back at these with my experience in life; as a Divisional Officer and Training Officer for cadets in particular, can appreciate these even more Courage of conviction and standing up for what is right has always been the hallmark of RIMCOLLIANS.

Each cheer of 'Come on Kapoor' was marked with spirited air punches and zealous

gestures by Mr Nene. The cheers of 'Come on Kapoor' resounded; Kapoor ran well and was ahead of the pack. Mr Nene's animated 'Come on Kapoor' went louder and louder as Kapoor crossed the finish line. A jubilant Mr Nene walked up to Kapoor congratulating him, "Well done Kapoor, you have broken the World Record!"

Mr Nene's handheld watch showed 6.2 seconds.

Why this record was never ratified?

What had happened was, with his thumb on the knob of his stopwatch, Mr Nene unknowingly stopped and restarted the stopwatch with each passionate cheer. Notwithstanding the World Record not getting ratified, both Mr Nene and Kapoor are legends in our hearts. Whenever we witness an Athletic event, "Come on Kapoor" is a story we love recounting and a favourite folklore.

RIMC was lucky to host Padmashree Pt Vishwa Mohan Bhatt as he agreed to perform in front of a large gathering of students here on Tuesday, 4 March, 2014. Pt Vishwa Mohan Bhatt has acquired international acclaim for creating the 'Mohan Veena', a hybrid slide guitar. A foremost disciple of Pt Ravi Shankar, Pt Vishwa Mohan belongs to the elite body of musicians which traces its origins to the Mughal Emperor, Akbar's court musician, Tansen and his guru, Swami Haridas. He has performed extensively in the US, Canada, the UK, Germany, Spain, France, Italy, Netherlands, Belgium, Scotland, Switzerland, Denmark and throughout India. Some of his

great performances include a concert at Madison Square Garden (New York) on the 50" Anniversary of the United Nation (UNO) 1995, performances at Royal Albert Hall (London) on the celebration of 'BBC PROMS 100 YEARS' 1994, Lincoln Centre (New York) on the '125" Anniversary of Mahatma Gandhi' and a concert at the festival of 'International Guitar Stars' (Toronto), 1995. He was granted an honorary citizenship of USA in 1989 and Canada in 1990. With his sheer virtuosity and limitless supply of melodies, he won the highest Award for Music, the Grammy Award in 1994 along with Ry Cooder for their World Music Album, 'A Meeting by the River'. For his




immense contribution to the field of Indian Classical Music, he was awarded the Padmashree Award in 2002 by the Government of India. With a career spanning over 40 years, Pt Vishwa Mohan has been delighting the audience with his mesmerizing music.





On 29 June, RIMCOLLIAN Yogesh Tiwari, of the 163" Course, along with Rajnikant Yadav and support crew of Bhrigu Sharda, Yuvraj Pratap Singh, Shakti Singh and Dr Anees set out from Rohtang Pass and cycled nonstop to cover 11 out of 16 proposed passes. They were successful in establishing the world record by doing these 11 passes cycling nonstop including the five highest passes of the world and on the toughest route of the world, also the highest motorable road.

They successfully completed the world record attempt for clearing maximum number of mountain passes on a nonstop cycle ride.



MÉLANGE OF CREATIVITY



Literary fests have always been an important part of a Cadet's life at RIMC. On 21" of August, 10 cadets left for Welhams to be a part of the IPSC Literary Fest. It was a novel experience for the cadets. A total of 240 participants from 22 schools all over India took part in the Fest. The Fest was a three day affair and saw the students zestfully taking part in a number of events like Vaad Bhi Mera Vivaad Bhi Mera, i.e. the Hindi Turncoat, Spellathon, English Script Writing and Dramatization, Ode Recitation and Hindi and English Declamation and Literary Quiz.

The cadets did extremely well and bagged the Third position in the English Play and the Hindi Turncoat and also qualified for the Literature Quiz and the Spellathon. The cadets were also praised by the teachers and staff for their immaculate discipline and conduct...

Overall, it was an enriching and learning experience for the cadets.

Starting from Rohtang Pass on 29 June 2014 at 1750hrs and crossing 11 passes till Khardungla Pass (highest motorable pass in the world), they covered the following passes on this route:

- 1. Rohtang Pass (3978m)
- 2 Baralacha Pass (4650m)
- 3 Nakeela Pass (4740m)
- 4 Lachung la Pass (5059m)
- 5 Pologonka la Pass (5060m)
- 6 Namshang la Pass (4990m)
- 7 Pilung la Pass (4885m)
- 8 Tanglang la Pass (5326m) (second highest pass)
- 9 Chang la Pass (5183m) (third highest pass)
- 10 Wari la Pass (5130m) (fourth highest)
- 11 Khardungla Pass (5602m) (highest motorable pass)

They also completed successfully their ascent to the highest point in the Himalayas i.e. Khardungla Pass (5602m) on a nonstop cycle ride from Rohtang Pass, having thereby attempted and successfully

completed twin world record attempts for maximum number of mountain passes and the highest on the Himalayas, nonstop on a cycle.

Climbing passes, braving all possible natural extremities like rains, landslides, hailstorms and snow was a herculean task Adding to the difficulty was an ongoing continuous fight with sleep and fatigue. Low oxygen concentration at high altitude was again a major hurdle, but nothing could deter the steadfast resolution of the cyclists. Climbing passes in this environment got them panting for breath and on many occasions they were almost choked and had to dismount from their cycles, take a few deep breaths to relax and resume. The roads too were full of flowing icy water, pits, stones, mud, silt and snow.

The climb to Changla was in the midst of hailstorm at the base which turned to light snowfall when they reached the top. The entire climb to Wari was in the

darkest of nights in heavy rains. While Tanglangla got them choking for breath, Nakeela and Baralacha were extremely tough climbs through 21 Gata loops. Pologonkola was a great relief as it provided a mesmerising view of Kaigar Tso Lake, so was Namshamgla and Pilungla that gave a serene view of Tsomoriri Lake.

Toughest of all was the final ascent to the highest motorable pass, Khardungla, in heavy snowfall and bone chilling cold. They had to cross two landslides lifting their cycles above their shoulders and walking in ankle deep mud between falling stones, leaving behind the support crew praying for them. Fearing frost bite, they put in maximum possible efforts to reach the Pass, constantly shaking their toes and fingers to keep them from getting numb. Descent was furthermore dangerous in hardened snow and numb fingers disabled them even to hold brakes. Still nothing could mar their spirits and they

successfully completed their expedition and crossed 11 mountain passes, cycling nonstop, doing maximum number of mountain passes, an unprecedented effort ever made by anyone in the world.

The 163" RIMCOLLIANS are greatly thankful to the Cochin Biker's Club for sponsoring the trek cycles, Mr Akshay Bajai, for helping them in their endeavour to establish this record and also acknowledge the selfless efforts of the REDBULL, under whose aegis they could reiterate this daring feat.

The entire RIMC Fraternity is indeed extremely proud of them. HEARTIEST CONGRATULATIONS & BEST WISHES for your future endeavours.


BRAINSTORMING TO VICTORY AGAIN..

Cadets Ishan Trivedi and Suraj Verma represented RIMC in the debates. They did extremely well though none of them ended with a podium finish.




The Quest For Intellect.



the performance of the cadets and expressed his satisfaction over the progress made and the records broken.




